FINAL REPORT

MOST RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:-

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India vide its order dated 11.11.2016, was pleased to constitute a three member Committee with the directions inter-alia to carry out physical verification of available shelters for urban homeless in each State/UT; to verify that the shelters are in compliance of the operational guidelines for the scheme of 'Shelters for Urban Homeless' under the National Urban Livelihoods Mission (NULM); to inquire into the reasons for the slow progress in the setting up of shelter homes by the States/Union Territories; to inquire about the non-utilization and /or diversion/mis-utilization of the funds allocated and finally the Committee shall issue suitable recommendations to the State Governments to ensure that at least temporary shelters are provided for the urban homeless in the urban areas to protect them during the winter season and the State Government shall ensure compliance with the recommendations along with the time frame indicated by the committee. The Committee was directed to submit its report within a period of four months.

The Constitution of the said committee was duly notified by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation vide Gazette Notification dated 08.12.2016.

Letter dated 13.12.2016, was issued by the Deputy Secretary, Ministry of HUPA on behalf of the Committee to the Chief Secretaries/Administrators of all the States/Union Territories informing them about the constitution of the Committee by the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India and the Notification issued by the Government of India and also about the proposed visit of the Committee for physical verification of shelters in each State/Union Territory and detailed interaction with the State Administration and all concerned authorities.

The Committee has already submitted its Interim Report dated 31/03/2017, and by that time the committee could only visit the following States/Union Territories:-

1. Delhi

2. Punjab

3. Haryana

4. Chandigarh

5. Rajasthan; and

6. Maharashtra

The aforesaid Writ Petitions came up for hearing before the Hon'ble Court on 02.05.2017, when it was pointed out by the Petitioner, E.R. Kumar, that the Committee was to file a report and not an Interim Report and taking note of his submission, the Hon'ble Court was pleased to direct the Committee to submit the Final Report on or before 01.07.2017.

The Committee was to submit its report within a period of four months after causing physical verification of the available shelters for urban homeless in each of the States/Union Territories of the country, and therefore, there was no option left with the Committee but to submit its Interim Report as due to constraints of time only the above mentioned States/UT's could be visited by the committee. Even at the time of the submission of its Final Report, the Committee has not been able to make it possible to visit the following States/Union Territories:-

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In the aforesaid background, the Committee makes an earnest request to this Hon'ble Court to accept the said Interim Report as a part of Final Report in so far as the same presents the profile picture of the status of the Urban Homeless Shelters referred to the States/UTs therein.

To give a brief background of the genesis of various orders, passed by Hon'ble Supreme Court of India concerning this deprived class of Urban Homeless looking for a shelter in various urban cities of the country, it is submitted that an NGO i.e. Public Union of Civil Liberties had filed Writ Petition No. 196 of 2001 titled as PUCL Versus Union of India & Ors. wherein the issue raised was with regard to the non-implementation of various government schemes such as Public Distribution System, Integrated Child Development Services, Mid-day Meal Scheme, Antyodaya Yojana etc. and in this Writ Petition Hon'ble Supreme Court had appointed Court Commissioners for their valuable assistance in the matter. In this Writ Petition the Court Commissioners had brought to the notice of Hon'ble Supreme Court the appalling conditions of the people living on the streets of Delhi especially in the cold weather conditions. The Court Commissioners also expressed their concern on the tragic death of some of the

homeless persons in the capital city of Delhi in the winter of 2009-2010, which could have been averted, had there been proper implementation of various directions given by Hon'ble Supreme Court in the said Writ Petition (CWP No.196 of 2001). The Hon'ble Supreme Court took urgent notice of the matter and directed the Government of NCT of Delhi to take urgent steps to provide shelters to all those who sleep on streets, footpaths, pavements and such other like places with a further direction that these shelters must be fully equipped with all basis amenities such as blankets, water, mobile toilets and all other basis services compatible with human dignity.

Two separate Writ Petitioners came to be filed in the year 2003 titled as E.R. Kumar &Anr. Versus Union of India &Ors. (Writ Petition (Civil) No.55 of 2003), and Deepan Bora Versus Union of India (Writ Petition(Civil) No.572 of 2003), wherein the focus was laid on the specific issue concerning the shelters for all Urban Homeless in various States/Union Territories with the provision of availability of all basic and necessary amenities as well as their efficient management. Pleading the case of homeless persons, the Petitioners highlighted the plight of these homeless persons who were amongst the poorest and most marginalized persons and engaged

in low paying jobs and often sleep on pavements, railway platforms, under flyovers, bridges, parks, around religious places, footpaths etc. and this class who enter the urban cities as migrants in search of work/jobs and are without any means to have a shelter on their head due to their adverse economic conditions. As per the Petitioners, the population of Urban Homeless was more than 20 Lakh all over the country as per the Census of India 1991 which otherwise was not the correct estimation of urban homeless, as per the Petitioners. The Petitioners placed on record the inadequacy of shelters in various parts of the country and their poor conditions in terms of both quality and quantity and expressed for urgent need for an effective policy and time bound plan for construction of adequate shelter homes in all the States/UT and putting in place a monitoring mechanism for their efficient management. Petitioners emphasized upon the requirement that the shelters should be fully equipped with basic and essential amenities so that these urban homeless are able to live a life of dignity as guaranteed to them under Article 21 of Constitution of India.

The Hon'ble Supreme Court in the said Writ Petitions passed series of important directions to various States/Union Territories of the country including the

NDMC and MCD of Delhi and from time to time these States/Union Territories have been filing affidavits through their Principal Officers with regard to the existence of number of shelters, their future plans for raising construction of more shelters and also about the availability of minimum basic facilities at the existing shelters. The Court Commissioners have been submitting their reports from time to time and in all their reports they have presented the ground status of existing shelters in various States/Union Territories with the help of their counterparts and they have given valuable inputs and suggestions to help improve the condition of the shelter homes and how efficiently they can be operated so that the shelter less poor people can live a life of dignity and honour.

The Government on the other hand from time to time came up with various schemes through its Ministry of Urban Development such as "Centrally sponsored scheme of Infrastructure Development in Mega Cities, Night Shelters for Urban Shelterless, Valmiki Ambedkar Awas Yojana and Swarna Jayanti Shahri Rozgar Yojana. To comply with various directions given by the Hon'ble Supreme Court in the said Writ Petitions the Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation (M/o HUPA) had launched a more comprehensive scheme named National

Urban Livelihood Mission (NULM) and one of the main components of the Scheme concerns the Shelters for Urban Homeless. This scheme has now been renamed as Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana - National Urban Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NULM). The operational guidelines for the Shelter for Urban Homeless (SUH) under the National Urban Livelihood Mission (NULM) had been issued by the Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation (UPA Division) by office memorandum dated 13.12.2013.

The Central Government Scheme found approval by the Commissioners appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court, as well as by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and thereafter directions have been given to the States/UT's to ensure that all the shelters meant for urban homeless are in compliance with the guidelines laid down by NULM.

Besides Shelter for Urban Homeless, NULM has other components viz. imparting necessary skill training, financial assistance under self-employment programme, support to urban street vendors, and social mobilisation & institutional development and such components in one way or the other are to be converged with the shelters.

The very purpose of a shift from bare necessity of 'right to live' to 'right to live with dignity' no doubt has totally changed the scope and intent of the shelters for urban homeless. Instead of shelters being construed as a place where homeless persons can spend their night in whatsoever conditions so as to save them from severe cold or intense heat, the shelters have to be a decent place to live, mindful of the fact that the urban homeless contribute to the economy of the cities but survive, without having access to the basic necessities of life. The role of a shelter, as per the NULM guidelines, is to be a safe place for its inmates for washing, eating, relaxing and sleeping and the continuity helps to foster an atmosphere of peace as well as a sense of responsibility towards the shelters and a feeling of community among the inmates and more importantly to feel at home. In a shelter, there should be provision for psychological assistance and job training etc. which includes innovate training programmes, that promotes self-sufficiency and placement services enabling the inmates to get a job and earn their own bread and butter as per the skill attained by them while residing in the shelters, which would be the best purpose which a shelter can serve along with provision for medical aid, i.e. first aid box and visit of doctors from time to time.

Urban homeless is an issue not confined to our country but is a world-wide phenomena, more so in developing countries because of migration of large number of people from rural to urban areas in search of employment.

Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), 1948 states that everybody has the right to a standard of living that is adequate for the health and well being of the person and the family. This includes food, clothing, housing, medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond ones control. Article 25 of International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR), 1966, which India ratified on the 4th of April 1979, requires signatures to recognize the right of every person to an adequate standard of living, including food, clothing and housing, and to the continuous improvement of living conditions. It further requires the State Parties to take appropriate steps to ensure the realisation of this right, recognizing to this effect the essential importance of international cooperation based on free consent.

Urbanisation is taking place at a faster rate in India. Population residing in urban areas in India, according to 1901 census was 11.4 percent. According to 2001 census, this count increased to 20.53 percent. It has crossed 30 percent as according to 2011 census it is standing at 31.16 percent. According to a survey conducted by the UN State of the World Population, as reported in 2007, the country's population is expected to reside in urban areas would be 40.76 percent by the year 2030.

The aforesaid data gives a glimpse of enormity and magnitude of problem of, scarcity of homes / shelter homes for the urban homeless where they can live a life of dignity and honour. The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in Chameli Singh Vs the State of Uttar Pradesh, while dealing with Article 21 of the Constitution of India held that

> "Shelter for a human being, is not a more protection of his life and limb, it is home where he has opportunities to grow physically, mentally, intellectually and spiritually. Right to shelter, therefore, includes adequate living space, safe and decent structure, clean and decent

surroundings, sufficient light, pure air and water, electricity, sanitation and other civic amenities like roads etc. so as to have easy access to his daily vacation. The right to shelter, therefore, does not mean a mere right to a roof over one's head but right to all the infrastructure necessary to enable them to live and develop as a human being. The Right to Shelter, when used as an essential requisite to the right to live, should be deemed to have been guaranteed as a fundamental right. As is enjoined in the Directive Principles, the State should be deemed to be under an obligation to secure it for its citizens, of course subject to its economic budgeting. In a democratic society as a member of the organised civic community one should have permanent shelter so as to physically, mentally and intellectually equip to improve his excellence as an useful citizen as enjoined in the Fundamental Duties and to be an useful citizen and equal participant in democracy."

In P.C.Gupta Vs the State of Gujarat and Others, the Court took a view that the right to residence and

settlement is a fundamental right guaranteed under Article 19(1) (c) and as a facet of inseparable and meaningful right to life constitutionally granted under Article 21 of the Constitution of India.

Under the Scheme of Shelter for Urban Homeless, the Government has recognized that the urban homeless persons contribute to the economy of the cities and they are source of cheap labour in the informal sector and yet they live with no shelter or social security protection. The scheme for Shelter for Urban Homeless, as framed by the Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation and is often referred to as the Mission Document, lays down comprehensive guidelines as to how these SUHs have to be established, what facilities should be provided at the shelters, regarding location of shelters, regarding operation and management of shelters, funding pattern, sanctioned project, monitoring and evaluation and shelters to be a space for convergence. The homeless persons have been aptly described as the 'City Makers' by Shri Indu Prakash Singh, who is actively associated with the shelter rights campaign for the urban homeless in the country in his aspiring book "City Makers".

The Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation has laid down 2022 as the target year to

provide shelter to each and every urban homeless in the country. Undoubtedly to achieve this target looks like a dream as the road ahead appears to be very tardy and arduous, looking into the slow progress of establishing shelter homes by various States/UT's. However, there should not be any kind of let up or laxity and more vigorous efforts with all zest and zeal should be made by all concerned to turn the said dream into reality.

The Committee may mention here that the visits of the Committee to various States / UTs have been very fruitful as all such meetings were attended by senior officials of the States / ULB's / Municipal Corporations / Police / NGOs and sometimes the media people. Long interactions with all the stakeholders certainly dispelled many of the doubts raised by the participants with regard to the implementation of the said scheme of "Shelter for Urban Homeless" and created a platform for many innovative ideas to resolve the issues being confronted by particular States / UTs in implementing the scheme. These meetings have led to activation of State / UT administrations and all concerned authorities and this can be well appreciated from the fact that they have given their roadmaps to meet the laid down targets of giving shelter to urban homeless of their urban areas till the year 2022.

I. SOME INITIATIVES TAKEN BY THE<u>COMMITTEE</u>

1. <u>Setting Up of A WEB PORTAL</u>

One of the major initiatives taken by the Committee is the creation of a web portal with the assistance of Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation as well as NIC. With a view to have a complete data of the existence of the shelters in each State/UT and the facilities being provided in these shelter homes by the State/UT's and other agencies operating the shelter homes online, the committee recommended to the ministry to immediately create a web portal after taking necessary assistance from National Informatics Centre ('NIC'). The committee appreciates the efforts made by the Ministry and NIC in the creation of the said web portal within a short duration of time. The web portal 'www.nulm.gov.in' is fully functional as on date and all States/UT's have been directed by the Committee to upload details of all shelters on the said portal maintained by M/o HUPA. The existing position including all the facilities available at the Shelter with their photographs are to be uploaded on web portal in respect of each and every Shelter whether under NULM assistance or maintained by State Government/Local authority/

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Municipal Board/ NGO Trust etc. This will enable to ascertain (a) the number of existing shelters in each State, (b) further Shelters required as per the number of homeless persons in the particular cities/states, (c) the facilities available in each and every shelters, (d) to ascertain whether they are in compliance of NULM guidelines and with a provision to point out the deficiency, if any. All such details can be ascertained while being stationed at Delhi itself, and at a click of button. This will go a long way in ascertaining whether the States are making progress in providing shelters to homeless either by new construction or refurbishment etc, and whether the States/UT's will be able to reach the target as per Action plan/Road map submitted by them, till the year 2022, which is the dead line. The States are to upload all information in this regard from time to time and it has been made clear to them, that in case of default it will be taken that the States are not making any progress. (Minutes of meeting dated 17-1-2017 of the Committee are at Annexure- A and the proforma for uploading the details is at Annexure- \mathbf{B}). The statement showing the number of States/UTs which have uploaded the information in the web portal (www.nulm.gov.in) is annexed as Annexure- C

2. <u>Provision For Shelter Even In A Rental</u> <u>Premises</u>

Another major initiative taken by the committee was to impress upon the Ministry of HUPA to revise the NULM guidelines to allow the shelter homes to operate even in a rented accommodation. The committee during its visit to some of the major city capitals of various states was confronted with a common problem that the shelter homes cannot be developed at the relevant places where the homeless congregate due to the nonavailability of space, high price of land or the government and municipal buildings being not available at such places. The committee in its meeting held on 12.05.217 took a decision that the states should be permitted to lease out premises on rental basis including from private bodies/persons so that the homeless persons can be provided immediate shelters at the required places. The proposal has been approved by the Governing Council of DAY-NULM to permit States/ UTs to take buildings on rental basis on an ad-hoc basis for running the shelters till 2022 by which time the permanent shelters shall be constructed. The decision has also allowed for spending amount from DAY-NULM funds on refurbishment of such buildings. (Minutes of the committee and the minutes of meeting of Governing

Council of DAY-NULM are annexed as Annexure- D & E). The said decision of Ministry on the recommendation of the Committee will go a long way in facilitating the concerned State/UT in running of shelters on an ad-hoc basis at the places where there is huge congregation of homeless, such as near Railway Stations, Bus Stands, Markets, etc. till the permanent shelters are established.

The Ministry of HUPA has earlier agreed that there will be no cap on the limit of funds requested for refurbishment so as to make the shelters NULM Compliant. (which was earlier a fixed amount and the same is subject to the sanctioning of Project Sanctioning Committee.)

3. <u>Provision of Payment for OPERATION &</u> <u>MAINTENANCE under NULM, even for a</u> <u>Shelter not under DAY-NULM</u>

One of the major reason of non compliance of operational guidelines as have been laid down under the Day-NULM scheme by various shelter homes under operation in various States/UT's was found to be that the majority of these shelter homes are being run by the local bodies, religious bodies and NGO's and they are not being paid operation and maintenance cost as was admissible for a shelter home being run under Day-

NULM. Taking this factor as a major failure on the part of the States/UT's in providing the basic facilities/amenities as per the norms laid down under the NULM the committee in its meeting held on strongly recommended to the Ministry to issue fresh directives to all States/ UT's that each and every shelter irrespective of the fact whether a shelter is being run by whatever agency and has been constructed by the State or any other body, the Shelter should strictly be in compliance to the guidelines laid down under NULM, and should have the facilities as envisaged therein. The committee laid emphasis that each and every Shelter should be NULM compliant with facility of convergence, as the scope of the Shelter is not only to provide a temporary resting place to the homeless but is to reform their conditions so that they can be a part of mainstream. The Committee therefore recommended to the Ministry to make a provision for providing a refurbishment fund for each and every shelter so that they can meet the standard of shelters as are laid down under NULM and for that purpose NULM should be ready and willing to pay 'operation and maintenance' charges to all the shelters so as to make them NULM compliant. Such shelters can be converged with DAY-NULM to claim the organization and management cost as per norms of guidelines.

4. Addition of More Facilities at Shelter Homes

The Committee in its very first meeting had considered the provision in the operational guidelines of NULM with regard to the facilities at the shelters and list of amenities to be provided at the shelters was broadened and made comprehensive for better and dignified living of homeless persons. The proforma devised by the committee was sent to all the States/UT's so that before the visit of the committee they can update all the facilities/amenities as were laid down in the said format. Copy of the format is attached herewith as **Annexure - F**

5. <u>Development of Standard Format for Power Point</u> <u>Presentation</u>

The committee got prepared a presentation of the entire scheme of NULM as laid down under the mission document so that in every meeting held with the State/UT administration, Mission Director of the ministry could explain the complete scheme and vision as laid down by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation under the National Urban Livelihood Mission document. This presentation by the Mission Director in the meetings held by the committee with the State/UT administration including all stake holders helped in explaining the entire concept of the said scheme and

what the State/UT administration are required to do at their end to achieve their targets of providing adequate number of shelters to accommodate the urban homeless of their cities by the year 2022 and the provision to be made by them for basic facilities and amenities in the shelter homes.

II. WHETHER THE SHELTERS STATES/UTS, IN COMPLIANCE WITH NULM GUIDELINES

The States/UTs wise analysis of the shelters visited by the committee is as under:-

The Committee visited eleven States and two Union Territories and has issued letters to all the States / UTs to inform about the existing position of the shelters, infrastructure provided therein, as well as the proposed shelters to be constructed / refurbished etc. Apart from the States/UT's visited by the Committee some of the States/UT's in response to the letter of the Committee have informed about the number of existing shelters as well as the proposed shelters to be constructed / refurbished and the road map for setting of shelters till the year 2022. (The Minutes of meetings alongwith

appraisal of shelters visited are Annexed as Annexure G to N)

The State-wise position is as under:-

1. Telangana

In its Affidavit dated 27/10/2014 submitted on behalf of the State of Telangana, before the Hon'ble Supreme Court it was averred that there are ten shelters in operation out of which four are shelters for men and six shelters for women. They have proposed a target of twelve shelters and have invited proposals from other NULM towns. The proposed shelters will commence operations before March 2015.

As on date, the number of functional shelters in Telangana is twenty two and inmates residing therein are six hundred forty one. Out of the twenty two shelters, twelve shelters are at Hyderabad which includes four shelters meant for women and the rest for men. All the shelters are being run by various NGOs and operational and maintenance cost is borne by NULM. There are two shelters for men which have been refurbished at Warangal, one shelter at Jagtiyal, one at Karim Nagar which are general shelters, one in Nizamabad, one in Khammam, one in Suryapet. All these shelters have been refurbished and then there are three shelters, one each at

Miryalaguda, Mahboobnagar and Nalgonda. The shelters at Mahboobnagar and Nalgonda are likely to be shifted to Government buildings.

So far the position of shelters under DAY-NULM is concerned, the data is as under:

OBSERVATIONS:

- Systematic survey for identification of urban homeless has not been conducted in the Urban Local Bodies. State has, however, initiated a rapid survey at the ULB level.
- 2. Mapping the homeless in the urban areas and identification of land for the shelter has also not been done.
- There is a huge gap between the capacity of existing shelters and number of urban homeless in the state which requires to be bridged early.
- 4. Executive Committees & Shelter Management Committees are yet to formed at all the Urban Local Bodies under DAY-NULM.
- 5. Most of the Shelters are being managed by NGOs which are trained & experienced in the work. Shelters are managed in convergence with other line departments and state sponsored schemes.
- 6. State has submitted the roadmap for establishment of shelters by 2022 based on the estimated number of homeless in the State.

The State of Haryana has 93 Dharmashalas / Religious Charitable Organisations for night stay of homeless people and out of these 93 night shelters, 26 are maintained by Urban Local Bodies (ULBs), 32 by District Red Cross Society and remaining 35 by its NGOs / religious organisations. However, they have proposed that 76 night shelters managed by ULB will be refurbished within two or three weeks from 15/02/2017 and the one managed by Red Cross Society within 3-4 weeks and they have proposed to construct new shelters also for which all nodal formalities are yet to start but they have submitted the deadlines in which it is to be completed. So as to say a case of no further progress.

It is also stated that the shelters proposed for Financial Year 2017-18 to 2021-22 are total 17 in number. The functional shelters as per the status report submitted up to June 2017 are only 3 in number, i.e. one at Durgapur, second at Krishna Nagar and the third at Haldia. However, the Department of Women and Child Development and Social Welfare have constructed 41 homes under their different schemes and all these homes are functional. So it is a case of progress on negative side in so far as establishment of NULM shelters is concerned.

Register was also being maintained and the shelter was also being run in a very healthy atmosphere by the Trust. Similar was the position with Kamtipura shelter run by an NGO for children.

As per the Affidavit dated 17/01/2014 filed on behalf of the Government of Maharashtra before the Hon'ble Supreme Court 97 shelters were already operational in the State and 53 cities were identified having a population of I lakh and more. As per the Action Plan submitted to the Committee, the number of homeless persons in Mumbai was found to be 57,416 as per Census of 2011 and there were seven shelters having a capacity to accommodate 210 inmates.

The Action Plan for Pune, states functional shelters to be 7, number of homeless to be 950 and the shelters can accommodate 314 persons. For the rest of Maharashtra 28 shelters has new construction and 9 for refurbishment has been sanctioned and the likely date of them becoming operational accommodating 3750 persons out of total 5219 persons is March 2019 and the Action Plan is for setting up of 44 more shelters. So, the

progress is limited to further proposals and no progress is there on ground.

10.Mizoram

The Committee visited / caused to be visited shelters in the State of Mizoram. At Mizoram, the Committee visited Motherless Babies Home at Khatla, Aizawl; Transitional-cum-Children Home, Aizawl; Aizawl Shelter for Homeless, ITI, Aizawl; Herman Children Home, Aizawl and the Committee was impressed about the dedicated staff and the vigour in which the shelters were run by the NGOs without any help from any quarter and the shelters including shelters for children, drug addicts, alcohol addicts, mentally challenged persons in a very neat and clean environment. The Committee was also impressed by the management of the shelters, as well as the provision for basic facilities and cleanliness etc and informed them that all the shelters can become model shelters if the operation and maintenance charges are being borne by the Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation and some refurbishment which is required can also be done with the DAY-NULM funds.

Twelve persons were identified as homeless as per the survey of 2011 and there was one shelter maintained

by the Municipal Corporation at Aizawl and further two were proposed to be constructed. Five shelters were found functioning in nine projects for new construction and five for refurbishment. Out of new construction, one was completed. So it is a case of good progress.

So far the position of shelters under DAY-NULM is concerned, the data is as under:

- State has conducted a rapid survey at the ULB level to identify the urban homeless.
- 2. Mapping the homeless in the urban areas and identification of land for the shelters has been done.

7. In view of the capacity of shelters being more than the number of homeless, there is no immediate requirement for preparing a roadmap for establishment of more shelters in the State.

11. Uttar Pradesh

The Committee visited / caused to be visited shelters in the State of Uttar Pradesh. The basic facilities and proper management was also available at the shelters at Char Bagh and Geeta Path in Lucknow. Two shelters at Chunniganj, Kanpur and Lala Lajpat Rai shelter were at medical college hospital, and the shelter at Kaka Dam, Kanpur.

As per the letter dated 27/12/2016 submitted with the Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation, the State of Uttar Pradesh had 146 shelters for accommodating 5324 urban homeless in various cities and none of them were under DAY-NULM. In seventeen cases refurbishment was in progress under DAY-NULM. Out of ninety one shelters, seventy two being new and nineteen shelters have been sanctioned for refurbishment.

So the State is lacking for behind in construction of shelter and the progress is nil.

12.Chandigarh

The Committee visited / caused to be visited shelters in the Chandigarh Administration. It can be said that the shelter at Chandigarh run by the Red Cross Society was well managed. The shelters at Mohali and Panchkula also had certain basic facilities.

There were two permanent shelters, one for the truck drivers as well as for general homeless managed by

contractors engaged by ULBs and the second shelter was being managed by the Red Cross Society. Apart from the above two shelters there were also ten temporary shelters. One shelter was proposed to accommodate three hundred and fifty homeless people. The shelter meant for truck drivers and support staff cannot be strictly termed as a shelter for urban homeless firstly because in strict sense these drivers and support staff cannot be categorised as urban homeless and secondly because it is located too far away from the city and in a truck parking area where mostly drivers take rest during their journey. Five new shelters under DAY-NULM are proposed to be constructed as informed to the committee by the UT administration. However, the proposal itself is at an initial stage and so it is a case of no further progress.

13.Delhi

The Committee visited / caused to be visited fifty shelters in the State of Delhi. The shelters bearing Code Nos. 582, 243, 244 which are Geeta Ghat, Code No. 247 at Yamuna Bank, Shelter Code No 216, 217, 240, 241, 554 at Dandi Park, Shelter No 97, 98 at Yamuna Bazaar which have some facilities like kitchen facility, recreational services, medication, lockers etc but the fact remains that there were no facilities for integration of the inmates with other families and the blankets and beddings were cleaned only once in winter and hygiene issues were being compromised and there was no effort

to grant entitlements to inmates such as Aadhaar cards, Jan Dhan Accounts etc. It can be said that providing of one benefit or the other will not serve the purpose as it remains a charity that too only till the time it is being given without generating will, and help to the inmates that they themselves can become self-sufficient.

Some other shelters visited were at Bapu Park, Kilokari Gaon, Dwarka Sector 3, Phase-I and Phase-II, Code No 092, 175 and 222 at Tilak Nagar; Code Nos 128 and 129 near Nehru Place Metro Station; Code No 127 at Kalkaji Mandir; Code No 507 near Nehru Place flyover, which was a tented shelter abutting the main road; Code No 508 was also a tented shelter abutting the main road; Code No 148 at AIIMS Safdarjung side; rain basera Code No 91 near Safdarjung Flyover; rain basera Code No 120 which in fact was closed and not functional for the last one year; rain basera Code No 212 near Max Hospital; rain basera Code No 78 at Sarai Peepal Thala, Adarsh Nagar; rain basera Code No 69 at Trilokpuri Basti; rain basera Code No. 204 near Chand Cinema, Trilokpuri; rain basera Code No 145 near Mother Dairy, Ganesh Nagar; rain basera Code No. 131 near Akshardham Temple Metro Station; rain basera Code Nos 111 and 112 at Chillia Gaon Khader; rain basera Code No 130 at Geeta Colony; rain basera Code No 201

at Shashtri Patk (near Wine Shop); rain basera 95 at Shakarpur School Block; male shelter Code No 211 at Idgah Telephone Exchange, Faiz Road; male shelter code Nos 139 and 140 at Jhandewalan (Opposite Idgah Telephone Exchange); male shelter Code No 13 at Jhandewalan; rain basera code No. 143 at Sector 12, Dwarka; male shelter Code No 229 at Sector-10, Dwarka; shelter for women Code No 117 at Raja Bazaar, Bangla Sahib Road; male old age shelter code No 84 at Bangla Sahib Road; shelter for women code Nos 85 and 224 at Bangla Sahib Road; male rain basera code no 233 and 234 at Bangla Sahib Gurudwara; rain basera code No 443 at Sector-I, Dwarka; Old age male persons shelter code No. 104 at Gurudwara Bangla Sahib; shelter for men code No 14 at Jhandewalan Road.

Out of these shelters, shelters at Bapu Park, Kilokari Gaon, Dwarka Sector-3, Sarai Peepal Thala 1st Floor and 2nd Floor, Trilokpuri Basti Vkas Kendra are in RCC constructed buildings / community halls but the rest are under public utilities / tents. So, majority of the shelters visited were not permanent shelters as conceived under DAY-NULM guidelines.

Even the basic facilities, i.e. provision of sufficient lockers, sufficient lights, sufficient beds / space for an individual, cleaning of blankets, sheets are not managed

well. The provision for CCTV cameras, provision for complaint register, provision for complaint box, maintenance of account register, proper ventilation, pest and vector control, provision of first aid kits, mattresses, bed sheets, pillows, facility of a kitchen, display board, drinking water, cleanliness of toilets were lacking.

The shelter at Kilokari Gaon was occupied in all by four families and one family had an approximate income of Rs.15,000 per month and the inmates were themselves doing the cleaning activity and were getting salary of Rs.4,300 per month each for two persons and the fact also remains that they did not permit others to enter the shelter and no management at all was there. The report in respect of each and every shelter is annexed herewith as **Annexure – AA toAA__**)

Besides the maintenance, operation and facilities to be provided at the shelters for effective management of shelters a linkage to the following six components may be strived for by the States/UT's:-

- i) Social Mobilization and Institution Development (SM & ID)
- ii) Capacity Building and Training (CB & T)
- iii) Employment through Skills Training andPlacement (EST & P)
- iv) Self-Employment Program (SEP)

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- v) Support to Urban Street Vendors (SUSV)
- vi) Innovative and Special Projects (I & SP)

In its Affidavit submitted in 2014 on behalf of Government of Delhi, only one shelter was functioning out of eight sites identified. However, in its letter dated 04/01/2017 it has been stated that there are 262 shelters including 64 tents and 2 subways. So far as tents, shelters and subways are concerned they are seasonal ones and operate only for one or two months. It is also to be seen that if in a particular space, there are four tents or four porta cabins all have been given separate numbers instead of one shelter. Similarly, in the buildings such as community halls at each and every floor the number given to a shelter is new, though for all purposes it should be one shelter. In fact, Delhi does not have permanent shelters as the shelters located in porta cabins cannot be said to be permanent shelters as the construction is not an all-weather sustainable construction, and is heated up in summers, gets very cold in winters and the rain water seeps in during the rainy season. There does not seem to be any plan submitted for permanent shelters, thought it has been stated that construction of four new shelters and thirteen for refurbishment under DAY-NULM are underway. Delhi has 52 special shelters out of which 12 are for children, 2

for the disabled persons, 15 family shelters, 21 women shelters and 2 drug de-addiction shelters. So far as drug de-addiction centres are concerned, the patients are taken for de-addiction cannot be termed as shelters, as only the space meant for residence can be termed as shelters. So it said that though Delhi has can be temporary arrangements but in fact does not have permanent shelters and even the temporary shelters constructed are not having convergence with the other components mentioned under DAY-NULM guidelines, and it is also a hard fact that throughout Delhi including Mori Gate, Kashmeri Gate, Nizamuddin, Lodi Road, Kotla Mubarakpur etc people still prefer to sleep at pavements and streets. Rather there are shelters existing at Nigambodh Ghat and near Hanuman Tample, at the Committee has observed while inspecting the site where a homeless died while sleeping on pavement, due to an accident, that a vast number of persons at 10.00 PM were sleeping on pavements and the ridge on the main road. The Shelter at Geeta Ghat was not at all ventilated and was full of mosquitoes. So progress is there but not in the right direction and only make shift arrangements have been made.

Delhi Government has asked for approval of their Porta Cabins for convergence through NULM funds. Necessary approval was granted. Delhi Government has unspent balances but there is no information about release of funds to the shelters approved for convergence with Day-NULM. So in fact there is no shelter functional under DAY-NULM.

It is an undeniable fact that Delhi, being the capital of the country, attracts huge migrant population from various adjoining and other States and Delhi, like Mumbai, is a dream city for this migrant population who come here in search of work and employment.

Delhi has taken a lead not only in establishing maximum number of shelters but also some of the shelters are equipped with most of the norms as are laid down under the DAY-NULM guidelines. In the recent past, there has been establishment of Mohalla Clinics along with the shelters homes so as to provide instant medical help to the inmates of shelter homes. There cannot be any doubt that despite various shortcomings and inadequacies in the existing shelters for want of basic amenities to fulfil the norms laid down under the NULM guidelines, appreciable steps have been taken by the Delhi Urban Shelter Improvement Board (DUSIB) in the establishment of shelters at various nook and corners of the city. However, still lot of work is required to be done to provide a dignified life to the inmates of the shelter homes and to establish permanent shelters under the Day-NULM at the places where the urban homeless mostly

congregate due to job requirements. The progress as regards shelters in Delhi is also been closely monitored through various directions given by Hon'ble Delhi High Court in a Public Interest Litigation (PIL) and also due to various directions given by the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India concerning the urban homeless of the capital city. Various NGO's and voluntary organisations are also pro-active to closely watch the progress and shortcomings in the shelters set up under the patronage of DUSIB.

Despite various steps taken by DUSIB and various directions given by the Hon'ble Delhi High Court and Hon'ble Supreme Court of India and active involvement of NGOs, Delhi has failed to provide adequate number of shelter homes of different categories to provide a shelter to its homeless people. If one travels on road during the night in Delhi, one finds that hundreds and thousands of urban homeless still sleep on pavements/footpaths, under flyovers, near religious places, parks and around various monuments etc.. Very often, these urban homeless, amidst their sleep meet their tragic end or suffer serious injuries when they come under the wheels of cars, buses and trucks driven by reckless and drunken drivers. Very recently, on April 20, 2017, a shocking incident of death of one person and injuries to three persons was reported

in prominent national dailies that a young boy of about eighteen years, while driving his car in a reckless manner ran over the said persons who were sleeping on the footpath, near ISBT, Kashmere Gate. Feeling shocked over such incident, members of our Committee visited the site of the incident at 10 AM on 21/04/2017 and to our further shock we found, two persons were still sleeping on the same pavement where the said incident had taken place on the previous night. The Committee Members also paid a visit to a nearby shelter to know the reasons as to why these urban homeless people did not prefer to sleep in the shelters. We found out that the urban homeless were not able to sleep in shelters due to mosquitoes flying all over despite the mosquito repellents and facility of coolers being provided. The Station House Officer of the area police station informed the Committee Members that within the jurisdiction of Police Station, Kashmere Gate itself, around 5000 urban homeless sleep on the pavements and majority of these people consume one or the other psychopathic substance and it is difficult to shift these people to the shelter homes and if they are shifted, then the other genuine shelter home persons will get discouraged to stay in the shelter home.

After taking stock of the situation, the Committee had written a letter to the Chairman of DUSIB to take immediate measures to provide sufficient coolers in all the shelter homes of Delhi and to also take other suitable steps so that the temperature inside the shelter homes, especially the porta cabins remain reasonably cool so that these homeless persons do not sleep on the footpath / pavements during the peak summer season. The Committee also suggested the DUSIB to suitably deal with the problem of mosquito menace by using mosquito repellents, fogging and pest control measures in each and every shelter home. The Committee also suggested to make arrangements to ferry the homeless persons to permanent shelter homes in the late evening and to bring them back in the next morning to the place of their work so as to discourage these homeless persons to sleep on footpath / pavements. Acceding to the request made by the Committee, the DUSIB initiated steps to provide desert coolers in all the two hundred night shelters and to overcome the mosquito menace, they have provided mosquito repellents and wire mesh to be fitted at all the doors and windows of night shelters. To combat the heat conditions, DUSIB got painted the roof of all porta cabins with a corrosive paint.

A separate letter was written by the Chairman of the Committee to the Chief Secretary, Government of NCT. of Delhi and the Commissioner of Delhi Police to bring to their notice the plight of these urban homeless people who sleep on pavements / footpaths in the middle of busy roads and who often become victims of road accidents at the hand of reckless drivers. It was suggested to these authorities that immediate steps can be taken to erect railings on both the sides of the dividers and likewise on the edges of the footpaths / pavements or to shift such urban homeless people to a more safe and secure place during night hours even if they are not prepared to shift or stay in the shelter homes. A copy of the letter dated 25/04/2017 written by the Chairman of the Committee is enclosed as (Annexure BB) It may be mentioned here that the Chief Secretary, Government of NCT of Delhi had convened a meeting on 31st May, 2017 where all the concerned Departments represented through their high level officials deliberated upon the suggestions given by the Chairman of the Committee. In the said meeting, decision was taken that the Delhi Police will issue requisite instructions to all its SHOs and Beat Officers to dissuade homeless people from sleeping on the medians of the roads, pavements etc. It was also decided that the concerned road agencies such as Public

Works Department and Municipal Corporation of Delhi will explore the possibility of installing the railings on the side of the central verges, wherever possible in a way that no homeless person can use the central verge of the road for sleeping. It was also decided that DUSIB, in association with the NGOs, will undertake an exercise in persuading the homeless people staying on pavements etc to move to the nearest shelter home to avoid any accident / untoward incident at the road side. The Delhi Police also agreed to deploy its staff in case of any requirement for the shifting of homeless persons to the shelter homes. Certain other decisions were also taken in the said meeting to improve upon the existing facilities at the shelter homes so as to provide dignity to the homeless persons and for their comfortable stay. A copy of the minutes of the above mentioned meeting is attached as Annexure-CC

Another shocking incident which was brought to the notice of the Chairman of the Committee was that on 18th May, 2017, the Delhi Development Authority (DDA), armed with an Order of the Hon'ble Delhi High Court to demolish the encroachments had mercilessly demolished the shelter home in Nizamuddin area in a very heartless manner. This temporary shelter was established by DUSIB for women and children and at the

time of demolition of the shelter, a large number of women and children were present inside the shelter. Lot of protests were launched by an NGO, named Society for Promotion of Youth and Masses, and Shri Indu Prakash Singh who is a crusader in the movement of providing dignified life to homeless people in the entire country, was also personally present at the site to lodge his protests over such illegal demolition but was paid no heed by the authorities. When this fact was brought to the notice of the Chairman of the Committee, he immediately directed for the shifting of women and children to some nearby shelter home and asked the DUSIB and NGO to take steps to move the Hon'ble High Court for reconstruction of the shelter home at the same or nearby place. The Chairman of the Committee also felt that atleast a prior notice could have been given by the DDA to DUSIB before carrying out the demolition of the said temporary shelter. Shri Indu Prakash Singh, Director, Aashray Adhikar Abhiyaan has informed that already a PIL has been filed against the illegal demolition of the said shelter home by the DDA. We also wish to place on our deep appreciation for the assistance and active co-operation extended by Mr. Indu Prakash Singh, Director, Aashray Adhikar Abhiyaan to provide us the

relevant inputs with the help of their counter-parts at the time of visit of the Committee to various States/UTs.

OBSERVATIONS:

- 1. Survey for identification of urban homeless not conducted in Delhi.
- 2. Mapping of the homeless in the urban areas and identification of land for balance shelters has not been done.
- 3. Although Delhi has provided maximum number of shelters, there is still a gap between the capacity of the existing shelters and number of urban homeless in the UT.
- 4. Executive Committees & Shelter Management Committees have not been formed. The shelters in the UT are being run by NGOs which have been selected on tender basis.
- 5. Delhi has not submitted the roadmap for establishment of shelters by 2022.
- 6. Delhi Urban Shelter Improvement Board (DUSIB) is managing 200 shelters, out of which 115 are porta cabins established to cater to the homeless found in the congested areas where land is not easily available.

 Delhi has not claimed any funds under DAY-NULM during the last three years.

Overall Grade: Good

- III.STATES/UT'S NOT VISITED BY THECOMMITTEE BUT FORWARDED THEIRROAD MAP TO ACHIEVE THE TARGETOF 2022.
- 1. Chhattisgarh

As per Affidavit dt 15-10-2014, filed by the State before the Hon'ble Supreme Court Scheme was at preliminary stage and project report for renovation of existing 10 Shelters have been invited. As per the letter dated 24-05-2017, addressed to Ministry, it is still at the stage of planning and proposing and as per latter dated 08-03-2017, addressed to Chairperson of the Committee, six Shelters are operational and 11 under construction case of slow progress. (The Road map/ Projection submitted by the State, detailing existing shelters and proposed to be newly constructed or refurbished is Annexed as **Annexure-DD**)

2. Odisha

As per the road map dated 21-06-2017, addressed to the Chairperson of the Committee, the number of

Shelters functional in the State are 20,35 more Shelters have been sanctioned, which in all will accommodates 3150 homeless through total no of homeless are 13931. Case of no progress. (The Road map/ Projection submitted by the State, detailing existing shelters and proposed to be newly constructed or refurbished is Annexed as **Annexure-EE**)

3. Arunachal Pradesh

The State has stated that since in hilly areas family ties are strong there are no further homeless. (Letters are Annexed as Annexure-FF)

4. Lakshadweep

The State has no slums or people without shelter. The total population is 64429, which is less than 1 lakh. (Letter are Annexed as Annexure-GG)

5. Goa

The State has 33 Permanent shelters, which can accommodate 2180, homeless existing facilities are sufficient and there is no plan to create new shelter.(Letter are Annexed as **Annexure-HH**)

IV. MAJOR FACTORS FOR SLOW PROGRESS IN THE OPINION OF THE COMMITTEE ARE AS UNDER:-

The key factors which contribute to homelessness are lack of affordable housing, changes in industrial economy leading to unemployment, inadequate income, re-institutionalisation of patients with mental health problems, psychological or mental illnesses, disability, substance abuse, domestic violence, joblessness etc which are not conclusive but are the main factors. Shelters, after considering all these aspects to such homeless persons, are to be provided.

1. Lack of will of States/UT's Administrations

All the States have shown slow progress in setting up of shelter homes for urban homeless though they are aware of deadlines as per NULM to accommodate all the urban homeless, in the shelters by the year 2022. During our visits to the aforesaid States/UT's the general . impression was that there is lack of will on the part of the States to appreciate the very purpose of shelters for the urban homeless. The construction of the shelters is mostly being carried out as a farce exercise without fully complying with the guidelines and parameters laid down

under the Day-NULM. The objective of the scheme of shelters for urban homeless is not merely to create some space for urban homeless somehow but to provide a proper shelter fully equipped with all basic facilities and amenities so that the urban homeless can stay in the shelter with complete dignity and honor and is discouraged to stay at the footpaths, pavements and under bridges etc.. The caretakers or the managers of the shelter homes lack basic managerial skills to tackle the inmates considering them as human beings and city makers contributing to the economy of the nation. As a result, the shelters constructed by the State Governments are never occupied to its optimum capacity and the excuse taken by the States is that since the shelters already built are not visited by the homeless there is no need to construct further shelters. In this scenario, undoubtedly the homeless persons will continue to reside on the streets / pavements and there will be no incentive/motivation for them to shift to the shelters and the States/UT's shall abdicate their duty towards this urban homeless people because of their failure to create suitable environment for the homeless in the shelters where a homeless person can live with dignity.

In every State including Delhi, persons can be seen sleeping and residing on the pavements as well as on the

streets at various places of the city and despite the fact. that some of the States have given due publicity about the existence of shelters but still the homeless prefer to stay on the streets / pavements. The reasons given by such homeless persons to the Committee when enquiries were made from them were that the shelters do not have adequate facilities, proper ventilation and, therefore, they prefer to stay on the streets. Another reason given by the persons who constitute a family is that the atmosphere at the shelters is not conducive for the health of the family and there are drunkard inmates and drug addicts who are not managed by the caretakers and it is the family which suffers at their hands. On the other hand, the States have given an excuse that many of the homeless people who stay near temples, bus stands etc do not want to shift to the shelters for the fear of losing their earnings which they earn through alms, charity given to them by way of providing food by different strata of persons, and donations given to them by persons / charitable organizations in the shape of blankets etc.

The blame game will continue but the fact would remain that there is no proper mechanism in place to educate these urban homeless about the real purpose behind the entire scheme of Shelter for Urban Homeless not merely to provide a stay to them but to impart skill

training as suits the individuals aptitude and liking so that they can be self dependent to sufficiently earn to have their own livelihood by their own skills and will be able to live a life of decency and similar habits will be inculcated in their children instead of their dependence on alms, charity and donations will defeat the very purpose and objective of the said scheme formulated by the Government to provide them a better life and a life to live with dignity.

It is thus the prime duty of the States to make the homeless realize their drawbacks and shortcomings and how they can be educated and convinced that the shelter is a house as well as a platform to become independent in life by acquiring skill training and not a mere place where they can just sleep and go. Unless the States/UT's take this as a mission with the aforesaid concept there will always be unwillingness on the part of the States to build new shelters and rather their action will reflect a very slow progress in this regard, and dispel the notion that the homeless are unwanted elements and cannot create a identity of their own.

2. Non-Availability of Land as well as High Price of Land at the Required Places for Construction of Shelters

Undoubtedly, it can be said that the concentration of urban homeless is near bus stands, railway stations, temples, markets, construction sites etc from where they get their source of employment in one form or the other to earn their livelihood and such persons are unlikely to stay in a shelter which is located far away from their place of earning. It is also a hard fact that either at such places land is not available for construction of shelters or the cost of acquisition of land for construction of shelters is too high which dissuades the States/UT's from spending huge amount of money on the construction of shelters (NULM does not provide funds towards acquisition of land which is to be borne by the States and the Centre only takes care of the construction cost of the shelters to the extent of 60% and 90% in the case of special category States and it is 100% contribution as regards UT's). In such a situation, either the States can refurbish the existing shelters and add further storeys in a vertical manner to accommodate more homeless people or shelters can be built at a distance not too far away with the provision of free bus service to and fro from the place of work. Such measures can enable the States/UT's to

take care of the homeless who are concentrated at a place where the State Government is not in a position to build shelters because of acquisition of land as detailed above.

Other option with the States is to lease out a land / building including from a private person and convert the same into a shelter by refurbishment to provide all facilities and amenities in conformity with the norms laid down in the NULM guidelines. NULM has recently decided to bear the cost of actual rental and also bear the cost of actual refurbishment without prescribing any upper limit. To meet the emergent situations or seasonal requirement the States/UT's can also create temporary shelters in the form of Porta Cabins on the model of such porta cabins established in Delhi.

3. Reluctance to Conduct Legitimate Survey

Each and every State as well as the Union Territories visited by the Committee has not conducted a systematic survey of the urban homeless, so far.

Identification of homeless is the basic requirement for providing shelters, unless the exact requirement is known, one cannot plan as to how many shelters are required, and the capacity of each shelter.

The identification and location of homeless persons, govern the location of the shelter as nobody can be supposed to visit or remain in a shelter which is far away from his / her source of earning, as a lot of money, energy and time will get wasted, and the very purpose of having a shelter would stand defeated.

The survey/identification of urban homeless should be an ongoing process considering the factors such as seasonal labour visiting States/UT's at particular time of the year and migration of persons from one State to another etc.

As per NULM guidelines, it is the duty of the Municipal Corporation of respective States/UT's to conduct such a survey but it has been observed by the Committee that in order to demonstrate that they have adequate number of shelters to accommodate the homeless population in the States/UT's, what the States/UT's have done is that they have conducted a flawed and imperfect survey and in such surveys they have shown the number of urban homeless to be far less in number as have been reflected in the Census of 2011. No doubt the census figure also is not the correct figure but the conducted by survey the Municipal Corporations/ULB's who were definitely an interested

party in reducing the number also cannot be relied upon and rather when confronted during visits of the Committee to States/UT's, they were not able to tell the give any convincing reply on the validation of surveys carried out by them to realistically determine the number of homeless arrived at by them and rather conceded that it was on the basis of a random survey. A survey has to be got conducted through a third party and has to be validated with the Socio Economic Caste Census ('SECC') data. Conducting of surveys is the foremost priority as without ascertaining in the true sense the actual number of urban homeless in the cities/ States/UT's and their points of concentration, construction of shelters will not serve the real purpose and it is only after a survey has been done in the rightful earnest, land has to be identified, acquired and then the shelters are to be constructed.

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4. Poor Management of Shelters

Providing of infrastructure of a shelter is not the end by itself. The approach towards construction and maintenance of shelter should not be that by providing a shelter, deaths on roads, due to extreme weather conditions or accidents can be avoided unless the urban homeless feel motivated and attracted to stay in such

shelter homes. This would depend on host of reasons and of one the important factor is that the caretakers/managers and other staff managing the shelters should be a trained staff with a holistic approach to deal with all kinds of inmates entering the shelter homes. The NULM guidelines recommends proper orientation, training and identification of shelter staff and during our visit to various States/UT's, nowhere we found properly trained staff to manage the shelter homes and to deal with the inmates entering the shelter homes. In our view without proper training and orientation the staff managing the shelter homes cannot deal with the complex issues as in these shelters from sick to mentally challenged persons, from able to disabled persons from normal to alcoholic and drug addicts, from law abiding persons to criminals and children of all age and women enter these shelters during day times to odd hours. It is thus quite imperative that the State/UT's through ULB's / Municipal Corporations conduct proper training programmes to train the staff and have periodical interactions with them so that such staff/managers become sensitive and proactive to deal with all the issues of the homeless including their medical emergencies and counselling.

Maintaining of registers, installation of CCTV, and provision for First Aid Box, are mandatory at every shelter home. The Caretakers/managers should have sufficient skills and qualifications to maintain and operate them. If the Caretaker does not know the basics as to how to operate and handle the said installations and facilities then there will be no utility of providing the said facilities at the shelter homes.

Similarly, the Caretakers / Managers should be adept in maintaining the discipline at the shelter homes and inter-se relationship between the inmates.

He has to assure that no person enters the shelter, in an intoxicated state, as such person is likely to vitiate the atmosphere of the shelter. Similarly, no person should be able to consume alcohol or drug etc. inside the shelter or create any sort of nuisance or annoyance for the inmates and surrounding habitants. The staff member has to be a watchdog, a counsellor, a sympathiser, expert in handling situations, and for that training should be imparted to the entire staff from time to time so that they are able to understand, rectify and withstand the happenings at the shelter. This is the biggest issue and most of the shelters are lacking in this regard. The States/UT's want to exonerate themselves, in providing a

good management and impart management training, taking excuse of lack of resources but in fact it is due to lack of will and due indulgence.

The States/UT's machinery or the employees of the States/UT's cannot by themselves opt to manage shelters as management of shelter involves understanding of the basic, social, general, special needs of the inmates, the approach towards the inmates etc.. To ensure better and efficient management of any shelter broad based shelter management committees as envisaged under the NULM guidelines is a must followed by quality audit of shelters by a third party.

Many of the States invite tenders from the NGOs to run and manage the shelters, Without any hesitation, it can be said that under a tendering process the State which is granting the tender will award the tender to the lowest bidder and the tenderers themselves in order to be a successful bidder will try to give a very low figure to secure the tender. For example, in Ahmedabad, Gujarat, a tender was awarded to run and manage a shelter at Rs. 20 per day per inmate and since it was the lowest bid by one of the NGOs, the other NGOs also agreed to run and manage the shelters at this very cost of Rs. 20 per inmate per day. This amount does not include the electricity

charges as well as the cost of bed and beddings and towards other necessary facilities which is borne by the respective Corporations themselves, but still it is a very low amount to even bear the expenses towards the salary of the staff manning the shelters. Certainly, all the NGOs will compromise on the efficacy of running and managing a shelter and would rather indulge in inflating the number of inmates so as to get more amounts from the Corporation thus defeating the very purpose of shelters.

5. Non availability of Address Proof - A Major Impediment

During the visit of the Committee it was observed that shelter inmates are unable to access the benefits of various government schemes viz. Aadhar card/Ration card/Health card/ICDS etc. On further enquiry, it came to notice that address proof is primary requirement for any kind of documentation which enables the people to access benefit under government schemes. Since by the very definition, urban homeless don't have an address, proof/residence insisting address upon therefore, certificate will lead to denial of legitimate benefits to them. Therefore, there is a need to simplify the procedures/required documents, so that the urban

charges as well as the cost of bed and beddings and towards other necessary facilities which is borne by the respective Corporations themselves, but still it is a very low amount to even bear the expenses towards the salary of the staff manning the shelters. Certainly, all the NGOs will compromise on the efficacy of running and managing a shelter and would rather indulge in inflating the number of inmates so as to get more amounts from the Corporation thus defeating the very purpose of shelters.

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homeless/shelter inmates, who generally belong to the poorest of the poor category, can avail the benefits of government schemes.

6. Sub-Optimal Utilization of NULM Funds

Most of the States/UT's are constructing shelters out of their own funds and the response of all the States/UT's visited by the Committee was that there is no scarcity of funds that they have for the purpose of establishing the shelters for urban homeless. They were impressed upon that as NULM funds can be used for construction of new shelters, for refurbishment of a shelter, its operation and maintenance and for renting out premises for shelters and that on any of the counts, there is no limit for grant of funds and if such funds are utilised and availed of especially for refurbishment and towards operation and maintenance of the shelters, the States/UT's would be able to provide a better infrastructure and better facilities to the inmates. So far as the Delhi State is concerned, it mostly has temporary shelters in the shape of porta cabins and very few permanent shelters and for such temporary shelters also the operational and maintenance charges are being paid by the Centre to the Delhi Government but still there is a huge amount of money which is lying unspent with the

Delhi Government and as a result, the shelters at Delhi lack various facilities and only a few of them are available that too in some of the shelters only in accordance with the parameters enumerated in the NULM guidelines.

On the other hand, though elsewhere in Gujarat, where shelters are constructed by the State Government, the inmates staying in shelters are less, than the actual capacity of shelter, but in Rajkot where new construction with NULM funds has been raised and the facilities are there, the shelter is occupied by inmates, to its full potential. In Vadodara and Surat (North Zone),Gujarat some of the shelters established in the city are having a very low capacity ranging between 6-20 persons and it is beyond the comprehension of the committee as why shelter homes with such a low capacity should be established. Such low capacity shelters are not in conformity with the NULM guidelines and moreover they will involve more expenditure to man them then to serve the real purpose.

7. Lack of Institutional Preparedness at the Level of ULB's / Municipal Corporations

There is lack of initiative and also no institutional preparedness at the ULB level for execution and

monitoring of shelters. Executive Committees under the Chairmanship of Municipal Commissioners of respective cities/municipal towns, meant for periodical review and supervision of shelter homes falling in their respective areas have not been formed in most of the States/UT's and at places where such committees have been formed their functioning is not transparent and periodical review meetings not taking place.

8. Lack of Coordination Amongst Planning Agencies

Due to lack of coordination among planning agencies, ULBs and States/UT's administration, enormous delay takes place in establishing any new shelter or even for providing funds for refurbishment of existing shelters. Planning agencies deny space and land required for shelters, States/UT's/ULB's delay clearances and approvals and non making of provisions for shelter homes in Master Plan or Revision of Master Plan as proposed under NULM guidelines, is another major factor which is totally ignored.

Invariably, the States/UT's do not take the Urban Development Ministry into confidence or to ask other land owning Government Bodies, such as Railways, Port Trust authority etc., to spare land for shelters for urban

homeless and such a step can resolve to a great extent the issue of acquiring land in various States/UT' to establish shelters for urban homeless to achieve the target of year 2022.

9. Non-Utilisation and/or Diversion/Mis-Utilisation of the Allocated Funds for the Scheme for Providing Shelters for Urban Homeless

The position of the funds released under DAY-NULM and the position of the funds unspent by the concerned are as under :-

The said data has been provided by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation.

No doubt there is money which is unspent as asked by the States for and released by the Central Government, and in some cases it is lying with the States for number of years but the fact remains that though there are funds that have not been spent but yet it cannot be termed as mis-utilized or diversion of funds.

The position is that the funds under DAY-NULM are released for all the components and not for each of the component separately and it being a participatory scheme, the audited report sent by the States towards utilisation of funds in respect of all the components collectively is accepted by the Ministry, and no audit in this respect is being done by the Ministry of their own.

So the position which emerges is that neither the Centre specifies or earmarks the individual components for which specifically the funds are being released nor the audit report submitted by the States and relied upon by the Ministry, gives details regarding spending on each of the components and it generally speaks about utilisation of funds collectively for the components and not for each of the component.

However, the Committee is of the opinion that the States while asking for release of funds from the Ministry must have considered the specific requirement for construction / refurbishment / operation and maintenance charges for the shelters, and must have also submitted record of utilisation of funds so released in their favour by the Centre to their auditors, component-wise. So even if the audit report is a consolidated report but still the fact will remain that the States have the complete data as to how much amount was spent by the each State on construction / refurbishment / operation and maintenance of the shelters. It is also to be seen that the cost of construction is borne by the Centre under DAY-NULM and the States in the ratio of 60:40. Since the percentage towards construction is to be borne by the concerned State, the concerned State ought to maintain a data as to said funds utilised by the State towards construction of

the shelters and if that information is passed on, then correspondingly the amount spent on construction so released by the Centre can also be determined.

With regard to operational and maintenance charges, most of the States/UT's have engaged the services of NGOs and other bodies for running the shelters and maintaining the same. So the data must be with the State. A letter dated 30-05-2017 (Annexed as Annexure-II) was written by the Committee asking the States to submit to the Committee the amount spent by the States on the construction / refurbishment of shelters as well as towards operation and maintenance of the shelters but till date none of the States/UT's have provided such data. Only when the said data is available it can be said whether it is a case of non-utilisation, misutilisation or diversion of funds. At this stage only assumptions can be drawn that the money which remains unspent can be taken as non-utilisation of funds as none of the States have provided any reasons as to why the amount released under DAY-NULM to the States, is lying unspent.

- Expedite land approval for construction of shelters under NULM.
- To conduct city-wise homeless survey accordingly to prepare plan for establishment of shelters in a phased manner by 2022.
- Converge all possible scheme benefits of the Government schemes for mainstreaming the homeless.
- 4. To ensure that non-NULM shelters are refurbished as per the guidelines of DAY-NULM.
- 5. Helpline/helpdesk may be started in the towns in which shelters are functional.
- Third Party Quality Audit and Social Audit of Shelters to be done.
- To computerize the enrolment and the profile of the inmates.
- 8. To conduct mobilization camps to enroll the homeless in the shelter
- Proper management, i.e. persons in charge should have managerial skills and proper training.

- 10. To match the identified locations of homeless concentrations with the neighboring shelters/municipal buildings through geotagging and to submit a plan of action for the establishment of shelters in a phased manner, including refurbishment of existing shelters and making them comply with DAY-NULM guidelines by 2022.
- 11. The State is required to design capacity building programs for shelter management staff so that they are able to discharge their duties as envisaged in mission guidelines.
- 12. To display hoardings and to conduct IEC-Events / programs, mobilization camps with the participation of NGOs / CBOs to create awareness and enroll the homeless.
- 13. The ULBs to make efforts for providing entitlements such as Aadhaar cards, bank accounts for homeless and to converge with other scheme benefits of the line departments such as social security benefits / pensions, skill training, suitable provisions in social housing scheme.

- To conduct third party quality audit on a quarterly basis, by engaging reputed institutions to assess the performance of shelters.
- 15. Installation of display board exhibiting available facilities in the shelter home, CCTV camera and individual lockers is to be ensured.
- 16. Essential facilities must be ensured in each shelter which includes drinking water (RO), sanitation, separate toilets for men and women, bedding, first aid kit with proper medicines and its description, recreation facilities, vector control, kitchen facility, etc.
- 17. The States/UT's may converge the services with Health and Education Departments to conduct periodic health camps / checkups in the shelters and to enroll the dropout children in schools.
- To engage reputed NGOs / CBOs / ALFs / trained staff for operation and management of shelters.
- Creation of jobs suitable as per their vocation be provided to Urban Homeless.
- Maintenance of Registers etc, as mandated. It helps in keeping profile of urban homeless.
- 21. All the shelters should maintain a biometric data of the inmates who visit the shelter. This

will in due course of time be helpful in determining the number of homeless in that States and the neighboring States, from where such inmates migrate or arrive as casual labour.

- 22. A Data Bank may be created, and once a unique identification number is assigned to each and every such inmate, the identity of each inmate will be also be established.
- 23. The inmate should be asked as to the nature of work done by him and about having any special skill. From this one can ascertain as to the nature of skill likely to be imparted which will enhance his own natural skills. This will help in finding / providing a suitable job for him. The determination of identity will be a step for issuance of Aadhaar card, Voter I Card etc to the inmates.
- 24. Background of inmates, and his/her family, will give an eye sight about the past and corrective measures to be taken by the managerial staff of the shelter.
- 25. Reaching out to homeless layout shelters through awareness not only in homeless, but in general public also, through awareness campaigns, and rescue of homeless.

- 26. Mandatory provision for food through various NGO's, charitable and religious organisations or under the social welfare schemes of the State/UT.
- 27. Periodical monitoring of shelter homes by the local police in plain clothes so that no criminal activity or any kind of nuisance takes place in shelters to the annoyance of the inmates and the neighboring habitants.
- Installation of coolers / heaters in all shelter zones depending upon the weather conditions.
- 29. The designing of shelters in a manner that can provide a minimum space of 50 sq.ft. per person or at least near to this space, wherever possible.
- 30. To take the help of State Legal Service Authorities and District Legal Service Authorities for providing legal aid help to the inmates of shelter homes whosoever require such assistance.
- 31. The Centre / States / UTs may announce some awards for the best shelters and the NGOs or any other operating agency to encourage and motivate them to do their best.

- 32. There should be restriction on maximum number of shelters to be managed by a particular NGO/Voluntary organisation to discourage any kind of monopoly or commercialisation.
- 33. There should be complete transparency in giving the management of the shelters to NGO's
 / Voluntary organisations and the prime objective should be how best a shelter can be managed and not at the cost of compromising the standards set out under the NULM guidelines.
- 34. Timely payment of operation and management cost to the NGO/ Voluntary organisations or other bodies running the shelter homes.
- 35. Shelters may not be treated as hostels for working women/men and should cater only to genuine urban homeless who sleep under flyovers, on streets, footpaths, pavements, hume pipes and such other like places.

VI. Directions sought to be issued by this Hon'ble Court

The Committee most humbly pray that the Hon'ble Supreme Court may be pleased to issue the following directions to the respective States / UTs so as to achieve the real purpose and intent behind the concept of establishing for the urban homeless and in order to seek that all the shelters are compliant of DAY-NULM guidelines.

1. That the States should create a web portal of their own regarding each and every shelter existing in the State irrespective of it being run by the State Government, Municipal Bodies, Municipal Boards, NGOs, Trusts etc and whether or not they are covered under DAY-NULM, depicting therein the name of the city, name of the ULB, name of the shelter, plot number, street, landmark, type, name of the shelter management agency, category, capacity, date of operation, funding source, number of inmates in the shelter, whether shelter management committee exists or not, staff in position for shelter management, their names, designation, details of inmates, number of families, number of men, number of aged persons, number

of single persons, number of women, number of single women, number of children, other category, if any, etc and to specify them in the proforma already devised by the Committee.

- 2. That the Committee had directed the States to upload all such information on the web-portal created by the Ministry and the Hon'ble Supreme Court may be pleased, to issue directions that the States/UTs will continue to upload the existing position in the said format on the said portal maintained by the Ministry (directions in this regard is being sought as the Ministry is not in a position to issue any directions to the States, as provision for shelters is a State subject).
- 3. The Committee has directed the States visited by them to conduct a survey for obtaining the number of urban homeless in the State as a whole and citywise and the survey is to be conducted by a third party. It has been seen that the states have conducted their own survey which is not authentic as different figures have been given at different stages and even some States have gone to the extent of reducing the number of urban homeless to absolve themselves from constructing new shelters. So directions are sought that the States are

directed to conduct an independent survey to be validated with SECC data which is under public domain and the Committee is impressed by the factors to be taken into consideration for carrying out the survey which has been designed by the State of Telangana.

- 4. Undoubtedly, the provision for shelters is a State subject but the Committee feels that since majority of the States have taken the plea that there is scarcity of space or cost of acquisition is too high to acquire the land for construction of shelters and to overcome this hurdle, the Hon'ble Supreme Court may be pleased to issue directions to the States to make provision in the Master Plan for shelters accordingly and if no provision has been made, then the States be directed to amend the Master Plan of the cities so as to make a provision for construction of shelter homes as per the requirement in each of the cities.
- 5. Directions be given to all the States / UTs to disclose the extent of amount spent by them on the component "Shelter for Urban Homeless" out of the amount released by the Centre for all the seven components of DAY-NULM. The year-wise details

may be furnished by all the States / UTs to the Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation.

- 6. Directions be given to the Ministry to constitute a full fledged department to deal with the said component of shelter for urban homeless and if feasible appoint a person for each and every State / city who can oversee the progress made by the respective States for making provisions / facilities / convergence and report the same to the Ministry without confronting the State authorities.
- 7. Directions to be given to States/UTs to devise a mechanism to simplify the existing procedures to provide residential certificate, health card, aadhar card and ration card etc so as to enable the urban homeless/shelter inmates to enable to have an easy access to the benefits of various government schemes.

Minutes of the Meeting of Committee on Shelters for Urban Homeless 12th May, 2017

A meeting of the Committee on Shelters for Urban Homeless was held at 12 Noon on Friday, 12th May, 2017 at the Committee Office, HUDCO Place, New Delhi under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd) Kailash Gambhir. Meeting was attended by Shri Sanjay Kumar, Joint Secretary (UPA), M/o HUPA as Member and Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, Retd District Judge as Member Secretary.

2. The meeting had been called to decide the further course of action to be followed in view of the Order dated 2nd May, 2017 of Hon'ble Supreme Court vide which it was directed that the Committee shall submit is final report before 1st July, 2017.

3. It was noted that so far the Committee has completed the visits to ten State/UT's viz. Delhi, Chandigarh, Haryana, Punjab, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra, West Bengal, Mizoram and Karnataka where the Committee after physical inspection of some of shelters also held discussions with the State authorities involved with shelter management. In view of the shortage of time, it was felt by Hon'ble Chairman that efforts should be made to cover the States which have large population of urban homeless as well as large gap in the requirement and provision of shelters, and where the visit of the Committee is likely to have a positive impact. Going through the data as per Census 2011 on urban homeless and the availability of operational shelters, it was decided that the Committee may visit the following States on the dates indicated against each in the available time before filing of final report before the Hon'ble Court:

Hon'ble Chairman advised MoHUPA to make necessary arrangements for the visits.

- In the meeting the following issues were also discussed and decisions taken:
 - a) The Committee deliberated on the issue of scarcity/ non-availability of land in certain metropolitan cities especially the cities of Mumbai and Kolkata. During the visits of Committee, the State authorities had apprised about the nonavailability of land at places where there is concentration of homeless. Hon'ble Chairman expressed that to meet the requirement of such places the operational guidelines of DAY-NULM may require an amendment at the earliest to provide as under:

As per provisions of the guidelines the location of shelter will be close to concentration and work sites of the urban homeless as far as practicable. Further, if need be, the Master Plans may be suitably amended to permit construction of such shelters or special permission may be sought from the competent authority.

In view of the above provisions, by the time the land is made available by the respective State Governments for construction of shelters, the guidelines may be amended to provide for hiring of buildings/space on rent. The provision of hiring building/space may be made available only as a stop-gap arrangement and efforts need to be made by the States to provide permanent shelters to homeless by the year 2022 as per DAY-NULM guidelines.

The buildings to be hired on rent will be for a maximum of five years or till FY 2022 whichever is earlier. Further, the cost of refurbishment of rental buildings may be borne from funds available under SUH component of DAY-NULM with the approval of PSC of respective States. The rental value of the premises may also be decided by PSC by taking into account the PWD rates/ prevailing market rate.

It was accordingly decided by the Committee unanimously that Hon'ble Chairman would write a letter on the issue to Secretary (HUPA) suggesting to amend the guidelines of SUH at the earliest so as to provide for an additional option to the states for provision of the shelters.

- b) The States may be allowed to provide porta cabins (on the lines of Govt of NCT of Delhi) to house the shelters under SUH pending construction of permanent shelter to met the target period lay down under the Mission Document for provide permanent shelter to all Urban Homeless as per the Mission Document. Hon'ble Chairman suggested that M/o HUPA may take appropriate action on this as well. If this also requires an amendment of guidelines, same may be done at the earliest.
- c) M/o HUPA releases funds to the States in a consolidated manner and it is for the states to earmark funds to each and every component of DAY-NULM (including SUH) as per requirement. The Committee was of the opinion that there is a requirement of clarity on availability of funds at the state level for SUH component so as to monitor any diversion/ non-utilisation of funds, as mandated by the Hon'ble Supreme Court. The issue was considered and it was decided that Member Secretary of the Committee should write a letter to all States suggesting that the funds for SUH should be kept in a separate head of account and

monitored. Further the same may be intimated by States to M/o HUPA for monitoring purposes.

6. The Committee has discussed and resolved, that all the shelters for urban homeless, whether under NULM or not, irrespective of the fact, as to by which agency i.e by the State Government, by the concerned Municipal Corporation, by Urban Local Bodies or any other local authority, or NGO, or Trust, etc; should be NULM Guidelines Compliant. In case any of such shelter requires refurbishment, for making the same NULM Guidelines Compliant, than subject to sanction by the concerned Authority, it can ask the Ministry to release the necessary funds.

A letter in this regard, addressed to the Chief Secretary to each State, be sent by Member Secretary of the Committee

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

Secretary (HUPA) Dr. N. Chatterjee, welcomed the Hon'ble Minister, Urban Development (UD), Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation (HUPA) and Information & Broadcasting and the Chair of the Governing Council Shri Venkaiah Naidu, Hon'ble Minister of State, Urban Development (UD) and Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation (HUPA), Shri Rao Inderjit Singh, Hon'ble Minister, Urban Development & Housing, Government of Madhya Pradesh, Smt. Maya Singh and other members of the Governing Council (GC). Secretary (HUPA) mentioned that the last meeting of Governing Council was held on 19th July 2016 and there is a substantial improvement in financial and physical progress of Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Urban Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NULM) since the 2nd Meeting of the GC.

 Joint Secretary (UPA) and Mission Director (DAY-NULM) Shri Sanjay Kumar, thereafter, presented the agenda, ad-seriatim, with the permission of HM (HUPA) and the Chair of the Council.

Agenda Item 1: Confirmation of minutes of the 2^{sd} Governing Council Meeting held on 19th July 2016

 No comments were received on the circulated minutes. Accordingly, the minutes were confirmed.

Agenda Item 2, 3 & 4: Action Taken Note on the decisions of 2nd Governing Council Meeting held on 19th July 2016 and Financial & Physical Progress of DAY-NULM in 2016-17

4. JS (UPA) gave an overview of the Mission and briefed on the actions taken on decisions of the 2nd meeting of Governing Council. In pursuance of the decisions, amendments to the guidelines of various components of Mission had been circulated to the States/UTs for compliance.

5. Outlining the financial progress JS (UPA) apprised that as compared to an expenditure of ₹ 244.17 Cr in FY 2015-16, an amount of ₹ 293.62 Cr was released during FY 2016-17 and further, a provision of ₹ 335 Cr has been made in FY 2017-18. He also mentioned that the Mission is gaining momentum taking into account the feedback of states, it is expected that there will be a requirement of additional funds during the year which will be sought at the time of RE.

6. Regarding the physical progress, JS (UPA) informed the Council that during FY 2016-17, the Mission has generated employment for 2,36,218 beneficiaries which is 255% higher than the corresponding figures of the previous year. The employment generated includes the urban poor placed in jobs after skill training as well as those assisted with subsidized loans for setting up

individual and group micro-enterprises. During FY 2016-17, 1,70,610 SHGs were disbursed subsidized loans under SHG-bank linkage programme, part of which is used for income generating activities. The quantum of self-employment generated would be higher if it is taken into account. It is proposed to capture this information during the current financial year also.

7. Under EST&P component, 4,01,654 candidates were trained which is 58% more than that of previous year. Placement of trained candidates increased to 1,51,795 which is 451% higher than that of the previous year. Under Self Employment Programme, a total of 2,55,033 beneficiaries availed of financial assistance which is 112 % more than previous year. In SM&ID component, 84,308 SHGs were formed and 71,818 SHGs received revolving fund which registered an increase of 145% & 199 % respectively. As regards SUH, a total of 1251 shelters have been sanctioned so far and 666 shelters have become operational in various states/ UTs. In SUSV, 850 cities have completed survey of street vendors.

Agenda Item 5.1: Proposed Modifications in Operational Guidelines of Employment through Skills Training and Placement (EST&P).

8. JS (UPA) informed that the Ministry has aligned its skill training programme (EST&P) with the Common Norms of the Ministry of Skill Development & Entrepreneurship. As and when the Common Norms Committee (CNC), the apex body to update and suitably revise the Common Norms issues amendments/modifications to Common Norms, these are incorporated in the respective scheme guidelines. For certain items, CNC leaves it to the concerned Ministries to take decisions as per the specifics of the Scheme.

9. The first two issues are placed for the consideration and approval of the GC, on which the decision of the Ministry is required. The remaining are the decisions of the CNC, which need to be incorporated in the EST&P guidelines.

a) Prescribing maximum and minimum hours of skill training per day:

10. JS (UPA) proposed to specify maximum and minimum hours of skill training under EST&P and amend the Clause 2.4.1 of EST&P guidelines by adding "The maximum and minimum number of hours of training permissible per day is 8 hours and 4 hours respectively. In case of residential training, however, a minimum of 8 hours training per day is mandatory. The cost norms to STPs may be worked out accordingly by the States" and approval of GC was sought to the same. This would help in optimal utilisation of the time of candidates and in rationalization of payouts related to conveyance, boarding and lodging which are based on duration of training. In PMKVY, payouts are calculated based on a minimum of 4 hours of skill training per day while in DDU-GKY, cost norms are worked out on the basis of a six-day week with minimum of 8 hours per day.

11. JS (MoSDE), Shri Rajesh Aggarwal suggested that, based on the experience in PMKVY, it is better to specify exact training hours like 4, 6 or 8 hours of training per day rather than giving a range of 4 to 8 hours for effective monitoring. GC considered the suggestion and opined that certain amount of flexibility needs to be incorporated for the states and agreed to amend the guidelines as proposed.

Resolution: It was resolved to amend Clause 2.4.1 of EST&P guidelines as proposed.

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b) Support for uniforms

12. It was proposed to insert a provision to allow uniforms for candidates undergoing skill training under EST&P. DDU-GKY permits one set of uniforms $@ \notin 1000$ per candidate for courses having duration upto six months and two sets of uniforms $@ \notin 2000$ per candidate for courses having duration more than six months. On similar lines, it was proposed to add a new Clause to EST&P guidelines "Support for Uniforms: For candidates undergoing training under EST&P, support for uniforms is permissible up to $\notin 1000$ per candidate for training courses having duration up to 6 months, and $\notin 2000$ per candidate for training courses having duration more than 6 months."

Resolution: It was resolved to add Clause 3x to EST&P guidelines as proposed.

 JS (UPA) informed the GC about the following decisions of the Common Norms Committee proposed to be incorporated in EST&P guidelines:

- (i) The employment outcome for persons with disabilities (PwDs), undertaking fresh training has been relaxed vis-à-vis that for other candidates. The requirement of placement of at least 70% of the successfully certified trainees within three months of completion of training for candidates is being relaxed to 60% in case of all disabilities except intellectual disabilities and 40% in case intellectual disabilities.
- (ii) The scope of wage employment for all candidates has been expanded to include enrolment of candidates for apprenticeship and work permit (work visa) for overseas employment.
- (iii) In case of wage employment, candidates have to be placed in jobs that provide wages at least equal to minimum wages in terms of cost to company (CTC), at least 80% of CTC should comprise cash in hand of the candidate.
- (iv) The base cost for training with effect from April 1, 2017 has been enhanced by 5% over that for 2016-17 and will be as follows:

Category 1 - ₹ 42.42/hr Category 2 - ₹ 36.44/hr

Category 3 - ₹ 30.35/hr.

- (v) Till now, an additional amount of 10% over the base cost was paid to all PwDs. This has been made variable from 10% to 25% over the base cost, depending on type of disability. Thus, the following will be the additional amount over the base cost of PwDs:
 - a) 10% for orthopedically disabled/physically disabled
 - b) 20% for visually impaired/hearing impaired; and
 - c) 25% for those with intellectual & learning disabilities, mental illness/mental

retardation.

(vi) In addition, training providers providing training to PwDs shall be eligible for ₹ 5000/- per PwD candidates for job outreach activities to enable them to reach out to potential employers. to MoSDE.

- (vii) The provision of collection of Refundable security deposit ranging from ₹ 250/- to ₹ 1000/per candidate (as per the level of the course) is kept in abeyance until the Cabinet takes a final decision in the matter. Hon'ble Minister and Chair opined that it is necessary to collect security deposit to attract only serious candidates for skill training, but agreed to wait for the final decision of the Cabinet. Accordingly, it is proposed to keep the relevant part of the EST&P guidelines in abeyance, while communicating the views of the Ministry
- (viii) Persons below poverty line (BPL) have been included in the definition of "Special Groups" which earlier comprised of only women and PwDs. This provision will enable all BPL trainees to avail conveyance allowance as is being availed by women and PwDs.
- (ix) PwD candidates will be eligible for enhanced conveyance cost, post placement support and support for uniforms besides provision of personal assistive aids at rates decided by the CNC.
- (x) Release of funds has been modified from earlier 4 installments (30%, 30%, 20% and 20%) to 3 installments (30%, 50% and 20%) and the release of funds could be batch-wise or as per project MoU.

Resolution: It was resolved to incorporate the above decisions of the CNC (from 11(i) to 11(x) through appropriate amendments in the EST&P guidelines.

Agenda Item 5.2: Proposed Modifications in Capacity Building and Training (CB&T) Guidelines.

a) Amendment to Clause 6.4 (c) of Operational Guidelines of CB&T

14. JS (UPA) referred to the recommendation of Executive Committee held on 28.03.2017 and proposed to modify Para 6.4(c) of Guidelines for Capacity Building and Training (CB&T), which provides for remuneration of Community Organizers (COs) at city level at a maximum of ₹10,000 per month. He informed that some of the states viz. Delhi, Chandigarh, Telangana, Andhra Pradesh, Chhattisgarh and Assam have revised their respective minimum wages for the prescribed qualification of COs during the last three years.

15. Therefore, in accordance with the recommendations of EC, approval of GC was sought for amending the Clause 6.4(c) of CB&T Guidelines in order to enhance the maximum remuteration of COs to ₹15,000 per month or minimum wages applicable in the State/UT, whichever is higher. This amendment will enable states/ UTs to revise the remuneration of COs as and when the minimum wages are revised without further reference to MoHUPA.

<u>Resolution</u>: It was resolved to enhance the maximum remuneration to COs from existing ₹ 10,000 to ₹ 15,000 per month or minimum wages applicable in the State/UT, whichever is higher.

b) Amendment to Clause 8.2 of Operational Guidelines of CB&T

16. An amendment of clause 8.2 was proposed after retaining clause 3.4 of the CB&T Guidelines. It was explained that the clause 8.2 has been restrictive in positioning of mandated number of experts at the state and city level. It was informed that the clause 3.4 provides for ceiling on the expenditure on CB&T component at the national level which is in line with the practice being followed in DAY-NRLM. The clause 8.2 provides for ceiling on CB&T expenditure of every state which certain states have found restrictive while positioning the mandated number of experts. JS (UPA) further informed the GC that the proposal has been recommended by the EC.

17. On a query regarding the rationale behind the proposed relaxation, JS (UPA) informed that the Mission has been extended from 790 to 4041 cities, which requires positioning of additional experts in CMMUs and COs in statutory towns. The guidelines have been modified in due course to position more number of COs than that envisaged at the time of the inception of the mission. Moreover, while some states are unable to position the mandated number of experts on one hand, some states viz. Arunachal Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir, Goa Uttarakhand, Chhattisgarh, Odisha & West Bengal have exceeded the prescribed ceiling on CB&T expenditure in FY 2016-17 on the other hand.

18. Additional Secretary (UD), Shri D.S. Mishra expressed that instead of removal of ceiling altogether, it would be better to raise the ceiling. It was clarified that the guidelines already have sufficient checks i.e. the maximum number and maximum remuneration of experts to be placed at the state and city level which would ensure that the expenditure on the component would not be disproportionate. Moreover, the modified clause 8.2 will allow the MoHUPA to review the expenditure on CB&T component and reduce the number of experts, if the expenditure is found to be disproportionately high.

Resolution: It was resolved to amend Clause 8.2 of CB&T Operational Guidelines as under:

"The Ministry of HUPA, taking in account actual expenditure by the state, may reduce the total number of technical experts to be positioned in a state so that the expenditure on the CB&T component is not disproportionately high as compared to the other components of the mission in the State".

c) Amendment to Clause 6.4 of Operational Guidelines of CB&T

19. JS (UPA) apprised the members about the need for amendment to Clause 6.4(a) of CB&T Guidelines which provides for salary of Mission Managers of NMMU. It was informed that EC has recommended for an amendment to the Guidelines to enhance the remuneration of NMMs under DAY-NULM in the range of ₹ 1,20,000 to ₹ 1,55,000 per month with a provision of 5% enhancement on an annual basis. The proposed move will bring the NMMs of DAY-NULM at par with that of the mission managers of DAY-NRLM. Also within the given range, the salary is proposed to be negotiated with experts in accordance with the prevailing practice in DAY-NRLM.

<u>Resolution</u>: It was resolved to amend the guidelines to provide for enhancement to remuneration of NMMs under DAY-NULM in the range of \gtrless 1,20,000 to \gtrless 1,55,000 per month with a provision of 5% enhancement on an annual basis and also to provide for a negotiation process similar to the one in DAY-NRLM to fix the salary within the given

Additional Agenda Item: Proposed Modifications in Shelter for Urban Homeless Guidelines.

20. JS (UPA) explained the background of the proposal stating that the Committee on Shelter for Urban Homeless constituted as per Order of Hon'ble Supreme Court has in its visit to various states, especially metros, observed that non-availability of suitable land in the metros is a major constraint in construction of shelters near the places of congregation of homeless. Secretary (H) stated that Chairman of the Committee has written a letter in this regard seeking amendment of guidelines to provide for hiring of buildings on rental basis for establishment of shelters as a stop-gap arrangement till the permanent shelters are set up. JS (UPA) clarified that the suggestion of the Committee has necessitated taking it up for consideration of GC,

21. Hon'ble Minister while expressing his support for the proposal suggested that land be sought for construction from PSUs, Railways, encourage CSR support, rope in reputed social organizations to run DAY-NULM shelters and co-opt shelters operated by CSOs under DAY-NULM. HM further advised that since railway stations, in general, have a high concentration of homeless, such requests from the states should be compiled to take it up with the Ministry of Railways.

22. Hon'ble Minister, HUPA directed that, since the goal of shelters is not only to provide a space for living, but also to provide a conducive environment to the homeless so that they can achieve their potential, access to skill training programmes should be ensured by organizing special screening and mobilization camps for the shelter inmates.

Resolution: It was resolved to add a clause to the guidelines of SUH

Clause 6.4: In case of the non-availability of suitable land for construction of shelters near to the places of congregation of homeless, suitable buildings can be taken on rent for operating as an interim arrangement and efforts need to be made by the States/UTs to provide permanent shelters to homeless by the year 2022 as per DAY-NULM guidelines.

Further, the cost of refurbishment of buildings taken on rent may be borne from funds available under SUH component of DAY-NULM with the approval of PSC of the respective State. The PSC will estimate the suitable rent by taking into account the PWD rates/prevailing market rate.

Agenda Item 6: Any Other Issues

23. Secretary (HUPA) informed the members regarding the consultations held for convergence of DAY-NULM with DAY-NRLM and NUHM. Hon'ble Minister, HUPA emphasized on convergence and suggested joint meetings be held to work out the modalities.

24. Hon'ble Minister, Urban Development & Housing, Government of Madhya Pradesh, Smt. Maya Singh, suggested that an enabling provision be inserted in the guidelines for providing food to the shelter inmates. JS (UPA) clarified that, the guidelines already provide for levying a nominal user fee which among other things covers provision of fully subsidized meals to old, infirm, disabled women and men and all children. For other shelter residents, meals may be provided at subsidized cost as directed by the state/ ULB. The guidelines further provide for tie up with charitable, religious or any other suitable organization to provide free food to the inmates.

25. Hon'ble Minister, UD & H, Madhya Pradesh, also suggested to deploy experts and COs in all the ULBs under DAY-NULM. JS (UPA) clarified that, the CB&T guideline have already been modified in this regard. There is a provision of one CO for every 3000 urban poor families with a minimum of one CO per town and at least two CMMU experts are to be positioned in the ULBs having population between 50,000 to 3 lakh. No dedicated CMMU can be provided in towns having population less than 50,000. The CMMU of the nearby town may coordinate the DAY-NULM activities in those towns.

26. The meeting concluded with thanks to the Chair.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD UNDER THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF JUSTICE (RETD) KAILASH GAMBHIR, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS, CONSTITUTED AS PER ORDERS OF HON'BLE SUPREME COURT

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02.45 p.m. on 05th April, 2017, Sahyadri Hall, Malbhar Hill, Mumbai

A meeting was held on 5th of April 2017 at Sahyadri Hall, Malbhar Hill, Mumbai, under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd) Kailash Gambhir. List of participants is <u>attached.</u> Hon'ble Chairman briefed the participants about scope of the work of the Committee as per the orders of the Hon'ble Supreme Court for physical verification of shelters. Shri Virendra Singh, I.A.S, Commissioner and Director, Municipal Administration presented the progress on Shelters for Urban Homeless.

As per 2011 census the homeless population in Maharashtra state is 57200 including 35000 homeless in Mumbai. Survey for homeless has been completed in 33 cities / towns and is in progress in 20 towns. As per the survey, about 4460 homeless have been enumerated in the 33 cities which indicate far lesser incidence of homelessness than the 2011 census data. The total shelters required as per the recent survey is around 446 each with a capacity to cater to 100. 40 shelters are already functional in the state including 9 in Mumbai and 23 additional shelters have been sanctioned in the recent PSC meetings.

The Hon'ble chairman briefed that comprehensive SUH guidelines were issued to the states, and further, Hon'ble High court of Mumbai and Hon'ble Supreme Court have also issued various directions to Maharashtra state for establishment and Management of shelters as per NULM guidelines. However the state is lacking behind progress and as against a requirement of 400 shelters, it is reporting only 40 shelters being functional. Out of the 40 operational shelters, 7 are in Mumbai city, one of which caters to men and the remaining are meant for children. The number is miniscule as compared to the requirement for 35000 homeless persons.

Hon'ble chairman directed the state to prepare a road map for establishment of shelters in a time bound manner. He also made an appeal to the Mumbai Municipal Corporation to conduct comprehensive homeless survey and to take appropriate steps for establishment of shelters by coordinating with line departments for land clearance. Wherever land availability is an issue, he suggested for construction of shelters with vertical designs and to consider porta cabins to solve the issues. Hon'ble Chairman suggested for refurbishing the existing functional shelters to comply with the NULM guidelines and also to develop a state portal to upload the shelter profiles and establish city wide help-line to be provided for facilitating the homeless. Joint Secretary, (UPA), MoHUPA, Member of the Committee suggested the state to study the land availability through resource mapping and ascertaining the ownership of the land. If the land belongs to GOI undertakings, the ULB may enter into an agreement with the concerned departments for establishment of shelters without changing the ownership of land. In this regard the Ministry is also willing to support the State/ ULBs, if required. JS (UPA) also suggested for completion of the homeless survey in all cities/Towns and to validate the same with SECC data. Further, he emphasized upon the requirement to conduct third party quality audit to assess the performance of functional shelters on a quarterly basis.

Commissioner Mumbai Municipal Corporation shared that high density of population, proportionate non-availability of green area and high demand for land in Mumbai city are the big challenges for establishment of shelters. However, Mumbai Municipal Corporation has made adequate reservations in City Development Plan 2034 and also made provision of funds for constructing Shelters for Homeless in the city of Mumbai.

Member Secretary, Committee directed the state to submit a comprehensive roadmap for establishment of shelters by 2022 based on the estimated number of homeless in the State.

9. The committee further suggested the following action points:

- Urban homeless survey to be conducted (If not completed before) in all the ULBs;
- Based on the survey, shelters are to be established either through refurbishing the existing buildings/Non NULM shelters in compliance with NULM guidelines or by new construction;
- iii. To conduct third party quality audit on a quarterly basis by engaging reputed institutions;
- Profile of the shelters is to be uploaded in the portal by the States;
- v. To submit a roadmap for establishment of required number of shelters by 2022.
- vi. In this regard the land for establishment of shelters to be made available by the state/ ULBs, adjacent to homeless concentrations.

The meeting was concluded with a vote of thanks by Shri Milin Sawant, Dy. Municipal Commissioner, BMC Office to the chair person and all attendees.

OBSERVATION NOTE ON THE PHYSICAL VERIFICATION ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS MADE BY THE COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS

DATE: 5th - 6th April-2017

Shelter Visited in Mumbai :

1. Salam Balk Trust-shelter for Boys:

The Committee visited one shelter functional in Andheri area of Mumbai Municipal Corporation, supported under O&M of DAY-NULM. This shelter is meant for boys, maintained by "Salam Balk Trust, an NGO which is working for street children and missing children in Mumbai. The shelter is functioning in G+2 type building belonging to Mumbai Municipal Corporation. The building comprised of wellfurnished hall, wash rooms, kitchen, care takers room, bunk beds for boys with space for recreation amenities also. During the visit there were 63 boys were residing in the shelter.

The shelter has good arrangement of Bedding, food, water supply Electricity, Education, Health care & Counseling and other related rehabilitation measures for the boys. As per the record, one shelter coordinator, three caretakers, one part time nurse, 2 helpers and 3 cooks were working in the shelter

The shelter is maintaining the following registers:

Admission Register, Attendance Register,& Scholl enrollment Register for Boys, Medical/ Counseling Register, Case histories of the children, note on family back ground/ profile of Parents Staff Attendance Register for Staff, Assets Register, Meeting Minutes Register, daily food menu records and visitors Register etc.

The Commissioners of Honorable high Court who visited the shelter during Decmber-16, have noted positive comments in the visitors note on the performance of the shelter.

Ms. Agnes Fernandes - Program Director and Mr. Bhavesh Bhatt - C.E.O.of Salaam Baalak Trust presented a brief overview of the shelter, process of identifying the street children/ destitutes, enrolling them in shelter, rescue operations if needed, counseling for the boys, enrollment in school, provision of food through convergence, reunification/ reintegration with the family etc. She has conveyed that most of the children residing in the shelter are children of Commercial sex workers/ single parent. Further program Director stated that irrespective of their family background many of the children are very bright in education and got meritorious awards from school as well in various competitions extracurricular activities.

The Members of the Committee handpicked and interviewed a few of the beneficiaries who shared information regarding their daily routine; academic progress and information regarding their family members. Some of the boys displayed their individual talents to the visiting Committee. Two boys performed beat boxing. The Committee also interacted with Keshav (who has acted in Hollywood Film LION).

2. Shelter for Vulnerable Children-Kamthipura :

An NGO PRERNA is working for the children of Commercial Sex Workers since 1986 in kamathipura (Red Light Area in Mumbai) by providing accommodation and care for the vulnerable children. During the team visit there were about 70 children at the shelter. The Care taker briefed to the committee that, the staff make house to house visit and interact with the sex workers to take their children's to shelter to extend care and support for their welfare and overall development.

The Committee members discussed with the staff about the space and facilities provided to the Children and suggested the Municipal Corporation to provide a building with sufficient space and basic amenities to accommodate the children.

Shelters Visited at Pune:

The Committee made physical verification of the shelters for urban homeless in the Pune City. Details of Shelters Visited :

- 1. Senadatta Cultural Hall, Navi Peth, Pune.
- 2. Bholagiri School, Somwar Peth, Pune.
- 3. Bunter School, Gadital, Hadapsar, Pune.

1. Senadatta Cultural Hall, Navi Peth, Pune.

This shelter is established by Maharashtra state government under the guidance to cater to both men and women homeless. Operation and maintenance of the shelter is being done by the Pune Municipal Corporation through the NGO- Pune Youth Foundation and s functional from 1st May 2014. Mobilization of homeless is happening with the help of community organizers, Social workers and social welfare volunteers through one to one counseling, Group Counseling and through motivational programs.




The Committee members verified the amenities with the shelters and the records also. Suggestion made by the committee:

 To explore the possibilities for construction of first and second floors to expand the capacity of shelter. To ensure all facilities as per NULM guideline

Bholagiri School, (Gharate Prakalp) Somwar Peth, Pune.

This shelter is functional by Pune Municipal Corporation in collaboration with a NGO Eklavya BAL Shikshan & Arogya Nyasa to cater to the children of commercial sex workers, alcoholic & Single parent, street & destitute children. At present 60 children are with this shelter who are in the age group of 4 to 14 years.

During the Committee visit, Trustees and President of NGO Ms. Renu Gavaskar provided information to the Hounrable Committee that: Eklavya Nyasa believes in education and skill development of the vulnerable children to avail opportunities for employment. Hence the NGO- Eklavya encourages the dropouts to continue their education and provide them with alternate career options. Further, extends counseling and guidance support to overcome from their social & psychological problems also.



Inspection & Interaction made by the committee:

- The Honourable Committee members Interacted with SMA/ NGO staff such to know about the teaching methods in practice and children's response, personal hygiene practices etc.
- Checked the registers which are maintained by the SMA/NGO.
- Verified the profiles of children documented by the SMA/NGO




- To converge all other scheme benefits for the welfare and rehabilitation of children
- To provide Healthy food for the children.

3. Bunter School: Gadital, Hadapsar.

The shelter is functional by Pune Municipal Corporation in collaboration with an NGO Bachpan Bachao Samiti .The Pune Municipal Corporation availed funds under NULM for refurbishing the shelter and for O&M also. The refurbished dormitory is proposed to accommodate about 50 children with bunker bed provisions. During the committee visit, the team interacted with the children in the dormitory.

Trustees and Secretary of NGO- Bachpan Bachao Samiti (trust), Mr. Mali provided information to the Hon'ble committee that: Bunter School Gharate Prakalp is working for Street children with the support of Pune Municipal Corporation from December 2007 for mainstreaming the deprived children by providing accommodation, with basic amenities, food, counseling and education. The members made conversation with the children through question and answer session to know about their school, their interest and available facilities.





Suggestion made by the committee:

- The refurbishment work to be completed within a month and the space to be made available for the children with bunker beds' provisions for their comfortable stay
- The profile of shelter be up loaded in the website
- Solar devices may be provisioned for hot water
- To ensure healthy food for the children

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MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD UNDER THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF JUSTICE (RETD) KAILASH GAMBHIR, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS,

DATE: 13th April - 2017

A meeting was held at 2:00 P.M. on 13th April 2017 at Conference Hall, Jal Nigam, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh, under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd) Kailash Gambhir to review the status of SUH in Uttar Pradesh. (List of attendees of the meeting enclosed)

2. Hon'ble Chairman briefed the participants about scope of the work of the Committee as per Orders of Hon'ble Supreme Court. As desired by the Hon'ble Chairman, Shri Shailendra Kumar Singh, LA.S, Mission Director DAY-NULM & Special Secretary, Department of Urban Development Govt. of U.P gave a presentation on progress of Shelter for Urban Homeless. He informed that 82 cities have been selected for the implementation of DAY-NULM in Uttar Pradesh, out of which 58 cities have population more than 1 lakh. Total 91 shelters (72 new+19 refurbishment), with a capacity to cater to 5916 homeless have been sanctioned so far. Out of the above 91 shelters, 3 are made operational, and for 10 shelters construction has been completed.

He further stated that the shelters constructed under DAY-NULM, shall be Maintained & Operated by the ULB itself or by the agency authorized by it in accordance with the GO of Uttar Pradesh No. 3964/9-7-16-98(General)/2016, dated 28.06.2016. As per the said GO, a Shelter Management Committee shall be constituted in each shelter, consisting of the ward Member, an Officer nominated by Municipal Commissioner/EO, Care Taker/Manager of Shelter and two inmates nominated from among themselves.

He further informed that a Call centre has been established at SULM office, Lucknow with Toll Free No. 1800 1800 155 to facilitate the homeless.

The Chairperson expressed dissatisfaction over the overall progress and slow pace of construction and desired them to consider temporary shelters in the meantime. Shri Kumar Kamlesh, IAS, Principal Secretary, Urban Development Department & Urban Employment and Poverty Alleviation Program stated that the State is taking steps to address land issues and committed to the Chairperson that the construction of almost all shelters will be within next 4 months. The Chairperson further said that coordination committees have to formed at each DUDA to monitor the progress of shelters, to sort out the land issues and for converging the various scheme benefits The Joint Secretary, MoHUPA, Member, Committee suggested that the shelters are not only lodging the homeless, it's a place to converge all scheme benefits meant for the homeless for mainstreaming them. Hence, the shelter Management staff and the Community Organisers should be trained in this regard. For example, the children with the shelters have to enrol in the nearby schools. One child psychologist may be engaged in each shelter to study and understand personal and family issues of children. The profile of shelter inmates should be computerised and the shelter profiles should be uploaded in the online web based portal. He further suggested to follow vertical building designs for construction of new shelters wherever land is a constraint.

The Honourable Chairperson suggested for display boards to exhibit the location and amenities within the shelters. In this regard JS (UPA) suggested for developing jingles to propagate the message of shelters functional with amenities.

Later, the long term occupancy of the street/ missing children in the children's shelter managed by an NGO Ehsaas was taken up for discussion.

The Honourable chairperson pointed out that though 9 out of 12 children in the shelter were willing to go home, the shelter management agency has not taken steps to explore the possibilities of their reunification with their families and not even taken steps to shift them to the shelters closer to their hometowns. He further stated that there are few children from Delhi & Patna and the SMA may take steps to enroll them in the shelter functional in Delhi and Patna. He further directed the NGO representative to take support of Child welfare Committees & Child line in this regard.

Ms. Sachi Singh, the General Secretary of the NGO-Ehsaas, responded that out of 826 children rescued and enrolled with the shelter about 767 are reunited with their families after appropriate counselling for both parents and children. The children in the shelter will also be reunited with their families is due course.

The Joint Secretary, MoHUPA, Member, Committee suggested for engaging child psychologist to study the basic problem of children and to initiate appropriate counselling and reunification steps in coordination with the line departments such as police, Social welfare Department etc.

The Honourable Chairperson suggested to the State:

- City/ Town wise comprehensive fresh survey to be conducted by the state/ ULBs for identification of urban homeless.
- Based on survey, to establish shelters either by new construction/ refurbishment in conformity with NULM guidelines.
- The shelters under construction have to be completed within 3-4 months period and the occupancy has also to be ensured by mobilising homeless through motivational camps

- The land approvals for new constructions to be accorded at the earliest.
- The profile of the shelters (functional) to be uploaded in the website
- To conduct third party quality audit to assess the performance of the shelters by engaging reputed institutions
- Converge all possible scheme benefits of the Govt. schemes for mainstreaming the homeless.
- A road map comprising of the above actions to be submitted by state to the committee
- O&M of Shelters need to be outsourced to capable agencies
- Capacity Building programmes for Shelter Staff should be conducted for effective functioning of shelters.
- Wide publicity of shelters to be done like by creating jingles, hoarding board and other means of publicity
- · City wise Helpline for the homeless need to be established

Shelters Visited by the Committee at Luck now

1. LATOUCHE ROAD, CHARBAGH SHELTER HOME

This Shelter Home was started during 2011 by Municipal Corporation (Nagar Nigam) Lucknow, which was funded under DAY-NULM during 2016 for refurbishment and O&M also .The Capacity of shelter is for 30 inmates and it is located very near to Charbagh railway station. In this shelter home mainly railway & bus traveller, labourers, rickshaw pullers, street vendors etc are staying at free of cost.

The basic amenities with the shelter are such toilets, drinking water, Common kitchen space and Kitchen utensils, mattresses and blankets, pest & control machine etc. One Manager/Care taker, 3 Caregivers and 1 sweeper are in position. Registers such enrolment register, stock register, housekeeping and maintenance register, complaint register, attendance register for manager/care taker etc. The refurbishment work in progress and averagely 25-30 people are staying in this Shelter Home.

The Committee interacted with few of the beneficiaries in specific a differentially abled person and his mother working as care taker.

Further, committee suggested that NGO may be engaged as SMA instead of engaging staff on contractual basis.

And suggested to ensure entitlements such adhar card, ration card and the social security benefits such old age pension, pension for disabled etc and food may also be provided to the inmates through convergence. Advised to complete the refurbishment works at the earliest and publicity about shelter homes need to be done through flex boards, hoardings newspaper ads so that the facility of shelter home should reach to all urban homeless.

The technical feasibility of vertical construction of the shelter building may be studied by the technical agency accordingly proposal may be submitted to the SULM by MC to expand the building capacity.

2. JIAMAU SHELTER HOME

This Shelter Home was started in the year 2011 by Municipal Corporation which was later refurbished under DAY-NULM in the year May- 2015.

The above shelter is located near Women Power Line Chauraha & Kalidas Marg, Behind Cancer Hospital which usually occupied by patients and their attendants, rickshaw pullers etc.

The basic amenities which are available are toilets, drinking water, Common kitchen space and Kitchen utensils, bed, mattresses, cooler, blankets, pest & control machine, first aid box etc.

One Manager, 2 Caregivers and 1 sweepers are in position. As per record 17-18 homeless are staying in the home per day. The registers such stock register, housekeeping and maintenance register, complaint register, attendance register etc. One manager and two care takers are with the shelter.

The Committee visited this shelter home suggested the followings:

- Inmates profile needs to be maintained.
- 2. Convergence as mentioned in guidelines need to be done properly.

GEETA PALLI SHELTER HOME

This Shelter Home was started in the year 2011 by Lucknow Municipal Corporation (Nagar Nigam) which was later handed over for O&M to the NGO "Ahsas Sanstha" in the year June- 2015, for Operation &Management of special shelter for children's.

In the shelter home is with basic facilities such toilets, drinking water, cleanliness, common kitchen space, kitchen utensils, mattresses and blankets etc.

The SMA is enrolling the destitute/ missing/ street children in the shelter. During the visit there 12 children were in the shelter. One manager, 3 care taker and sweeper are in position. Education for the children through convergence and various life skills are also done by the Organization. Food and clothes are provided to the children

Registers for enrolment of children, stock register, housekeeping and maintenance, complaint register, attendance register manager/care taker etc and profile of inmates are maintained by the SMA.

The Committee member's interacted with the children in the shelter, out of 12 children 4-5 of them are from Delhi, Nepal, Patna and 9 of them are willing to go home. Hence, the chairman Committee directed the SMA to explore the possibilities to reunite the children with their families or to shift them to the appropriate shelters functional

adjacent to their towns that facilitate the parents to meet their children. JS (UPA) suggested to avail support of police and social welfare department, child line services for reunification of the children with their families.

The suggested the followings:

- Inmates of profile need to be computerised.
- Children's care need to be done in accordance with the directives and guidelines of child welfare Committee.
- Schooling arrangement needs to be done in convergence with concerned departments.
- Medical checkups and proper nutrition need to take care off.
- Possibilities for reunification of children with their families may be explored and appropriate steps may be taken at the earliest.

Shelters Visited by Committee at Kanpur:

1. Chunniganj Shelter Home

This shelter home was constructed in the year 2009-2010 by the Nagar Nigam, located opposite to the Chunniganj bus stand. Further, this shelter have taken up for refurbishment in the year 2015-16 under the DAY-NULM.

Capacity of the shelter home - 50 persons.

- a) Ground Floor 2 Rooms with 10-10 beds for Male and Female, one store room and 1 office room for managers and caretakers.
- b) First Floor -- 2 Rooms with 9-9 beds for Male and Female and one Library with newspapers and magazines.
- c) Third Floor- 6 Family Rooms with 2-2 beds.

All floors are attached with washroom and Toilets. In every floor there are 2 kitchens with all kitchen amenities. The facilities such bed, mattress, pillow, blanket, personal lockers are provided.

The Committee satisfied with the basic infrastructure and amenities provided in the shelter. Further suggested to engage NGO/ SMA for shelter Management and to conduct mobilisation camps to enrol the homeless in the shelter.



2. Lala Lajpat Rai Shelter Home

This shelter construction has started in the year 2015-2016 under DAY-NULM (C&DS) to facilitate the attendants of the patients admitted in Lala Lajpat Rai Medical college Hospital.

Capacity of the shelter home - 60 persons.

- Ground Floor 2 Rooms with 12-10 beds for Female and old age persons/ differentially abled.
- First Floor 2 Rooms with 8-12 beds for Male and Female and 3 family rooms with 2-2 beds.
- iii. Second Floor- 6 Family Rooms with 2-2 beds and one Library
- iv. All floors are attached with washroom and Toilets.
- v. In every floor there are 2 kitchens with all amenities.

The facilities such bed, mattress, pillow, blanket, locker lockers, drinking water with inverter facility are provided in the shelter.

The Committee members interacted with the inmates, two of the women inmates are represented the team for ensuring treatment and provision for medicines in the dormitory itself. However, the medical attendants responded to the Committee the inmates are to attend the causality ward to get treatment and for availing medicine also. The Chairperson advised the medicos to extend medical care and support service for the inmates of the shelters if possible at the shelter itself.

The Committee well satisfied with the infrastructure and amenities with the shelter





3. Kakadev (Near Kulwanti Hospital) Shelter Home

This shelter home is established and Managed by Nagar Nigam of Kanpur. Located near Kulwanti hospital of Kanpur nagar. The total ground floor area of the shelter is around 300sqm which consist of 2 rooms, kitchen with kitchen utensils and toilets with bath rooms also. Required common minimum facilities are provided in the shelter.

However the shelter is located on main road with space for expansion also. Hence, the JS (UPA) suggested to study the technical feasibility to expand the capacity of the shelter.





Phoolbagh Shelter Home

This shelter home is refurbished under DAY NULM , and the refurbishment work in on completion stage. Capacity of the shelter - 40 persons. Rickshaw pullers are regularly residing in this shelter. The facilities such kitchen with utensils, bed, mattress, pillow, blanket, personal lockers, drinking water are provided in the shelter.





The shelter is having enough space for expansion, hence the JS(UPA) advised the Municipal Engineering team to explore the technical feasibility for expansion of capacity of the shelter.

The Committee advised the Municipal officials to ensure CCTV camera in the above shelters, document the profile of inmates and to engage NGO for managing the shelters.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS HELD AT KOLKATA

DATE: 3rd APRIL, 2017

A meeting was held at 12.45 P.M. on 3rd May, 2017 at Conference Hall,



Nagarayan Bhawan, Urban Development Department, West Bengal under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd.) Kailash Gambhir to monitor the performance of shelters functional in West Bengal. List of attendees of the meeting is *Annexed*.

Hon'ble Chairman briefed the participants about the scope of work

of the Committee as per Orders of Hon'ble Supreme Court and keeping in view the same the Committee is to visit the states for physical verification of shelters.

As desired by the Hon'ble Chairman, Shri Sutanu Prasad Kar, IAS, Mission Director DAY-NULM and Director SUDA, Department of Urban Development and Municipal Affairs, Govt. of West Bengal gave a presentation on the progress of Shelters for Urban Homeless Component of DAY-NULM. He referred to the guidelines and progress made so far from F.Y. 2014-15 to 2017-18 in the State.

He informed that 125 statutory towns have been selected (in two Phases) for the implementation of DAY-NULM in West Bengal. Out of the total towns, 58 towns have a population of more than 1 lakh.

He briefed that in 2014, a survey was conducted by the Department in to identify the urban homeless in which 6,468 urban homeless had been identified in the state excluding the Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC). As per the survey report of 2012, around 40,000 urban homeless were identified in KMC.

Under DAY-NULM, the state has sanctioned 28 shelters (each having a capacity of 50) but only 1 has been made operational (Haldia) and construction of 2

shelters has been completed, 6 shelters are under various stages of construction and remaining 19 are at the tendering stage.

Further, there are 41 shelters under Women, Child & Social Welfare Department (WCD & SW Dept.) Govt. Of West Bengal, catering to 1,860 homeless within Kolkata, Howrah and Asansol Municipal Corporations. The said shelters are functioning in the existing Govt. /Private buildings since 2011. The shelters are run by NGOs and O&M cost is fully funded by the WCD & SW Department.

The Hon'ble Chairman referred to the presentation of the Mission Director and stated that not only there appears to be a lack of progress in the state in establishing permanent shelters for homeless but also the State and ULBs are not taking steps to establish temporary shelters to address the homeless issues especially the KMC.


The Committee members suggested to prepare a plan for an intensive survey in all statutory towns in order to identify the urban Homeless. The progress chart as provided to the members exhibits extremely slow progress in construction of shelters. The delay in construction is mostly due to inefficient management of the tendering process.

Joint Secretary, MoHUPA, Member, Committee sought a clarification on the total number of urban homeless identified in the State citing that the number was presented as 40,000 in KMC whereas its only 6468 in other ULBs in WB. Moreover, the data of urban homeless was not following the urban population trend of the ULBs. He further suggested for a scientific approach for identification of the urban homeless involving the stakeholders.

In this regard, the Mission Director informed that the survey was conducted during the month of February at night for identification of urban homeless. JS, UPA suggested that a survey needs to be validated with the SECC data. He also mentioned that survey needs to be conducted at regular intervals both in agricultural and non-agricultural seasons.

Mission Director, WB informed that around Rs. 2 crore fund is required to conduct the survey in an intensive manner. JS, UPA suggested that state can utilize the amount available under NULM with the state. He further suggested that the shelters are not only the lodging facility for the homeless, it's also a place to converge all scheme benefits meant for the homeless. Hence, the shelter

Management Staff and the Community Organisers should be trained/ oriented adequately. The children residing in the shelters should to be enrolled in nearby School. The profile of shelter inmates should be maintained and computerised. The shelter profiles



should be uploaded on the online web based portal of NULM.

Further, coordination committees should be formed at each ULB to monitor the progress of shelters to sort out the land issues & convergance with various scheme benefits. It was also suggested to follow vertical building designs for construction of new shelters wherever land is a constraint.

Member Secretary, Committee directed the state to submit a comprehensive roadmap for establishment of shelters by 2022 based on the estimated number of homeless in the State.

The action points brought out in the meeting are as follows:

- Intensive urban homeless survey to be conducted for identification of urban homeless in all the ULBs;
- Shelters run by the WCD & SW, Dept., may be refurbished and taken under O
 & M of NULM;
- iii. Action required for ensuring the functioning of shelters as per the NULM guidelines;
- Based on the survey, shelters are to be established either through refurbishing the existing buildings/Non-NULM shelters in compliance with DAY-NULM guidelines or by new construction;
- v. To conduct third party quality audit on a quarterly basis by engaging reputed institutions/organisations;

- vi. Profile of the shelters to be uploaded in the portal by the States ;
- vii. To submit a roadmap for establishment of required number of shelters by 2022;
- viii. The land for establishment of shelters to be made available by the state/ ULBs, adjacent to homeless concentrations.
- Expedite the tendering process and complete the construction work of the remaining sanctioned shelters under DAY-NULM.
- Converge all possible benefits of the Govt. schemes for mainstreaming the homeless;
- vi. Police (in plain dress) and para-legal volunteers need to visit to the shelter periodically.
- xii. Adequate capacity building programmes for Shelter Staff should be conducted for effective functioning of shelters;
- xiii. Wide publicity of shelters needs to be made by the way of hoardings, sign boards and other means of publicity.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks by Ms. Mira Ray, Secretary, UD & MA Department, Govt. of West Bengal to the Chairperson and all attendees.

OBSERVATION NOTE ON THE PHYSICAL VERIFICATION MADE BY THE COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS

DATE: 3rd May, 2017

Shelter Visited in West Bengal :

- 1. Shelter for Urban Homeless, Telengabagan, Kolkata
- 2. Shelter for Urban Homeless, Chetla Hat Road, Kolkata

Shelter for Urban Homeless, Telengabagan, Kolkata

The Committee visited a Shelter for Urban Homeless at Telengabagan, Kolkata supported by Women, Child Development & Social Welfare Department, Govt. of West Bengal. An NGO named "Maya Foundation" is managing this women shelter. As intimated, the capacity of the shelter is



56 and average accupancy is 34. Mostly the inmates are working as maids or similar kind of household work in nearby localities. The organisation is receiving Rs.5.28 lakh per year from the WCD & SW Department to run it. The shelter is in a rented building. During the visit there were 5 inmates present in the shelter.

Observations:

- Pathways to the shelter area is very extremely narrow and the room size is approximately 20 ft. X 16 ft.
- Shelter has no bedding arrangements for its inmates.
- No food is being provided to the inmates.
- For recreation the shelter has a TV set.
- No locker/cupboard facility.
- No CCTV camera is installed.

- Though, it was intimated that doctor vists are organized periodically for heath check up of the inmates, it is not recorded in any register.
- Drinking water connection (through Municipal Corporation) is available.
- Two bath rooms are available in the shelter.
- Since 2012, total 172 inmates are enrolled in the register.
- Few registers are maintained but the documentation and record keeping is poor.
- Four staff are engaged for maintenance of the shelter.

The Committee members discussed with the inmates & staff about the facilities provided in the shelter and suggested to make the shelter NULM compliant as per the guidelines.





Shelter for Urban Homeless, Chetla Hat Road, Kolkata

The Committee visited another shelter for Urban Homeless at Chetla Hat Road, Kolkata. The shelter is funded by Women, Child Development & Social Welfare Department, Govt. of West Bengal. Iswar Sankalap, an NGO

is in charge of managing the shelter for women with psycho-social disabilities. The capacity of the shelter is 40. Most importantly, the inmates are ensured proper care and medical check-up with humane touch.

The building comprised of a hall, wash rooms, kitchen, care takers room and space for recreation. The shelter has good arrangement of food, water supply, electricity, health care & counseling and other related rehabilitation measures for the inmates. As per the information, one shelter coordinator and four caretakers were working in the shelter.



The shelter is maintaining admission register, attendance register, attendance register for staff, stock/assets Register, profile register for the inmates, suggestion and complaints register and visitors' register.

The Members enquired about the fund requirement by interacting with the Shelter Staff as well as inmates. The Committee directed the Mission Directorate to examine and take the shelter under DAY-NULM fold. Further, it was suggested to make necessary arrangements and ensure periodic (*weekly/fortnightly*) visit of Govt. Hospital Doctors to the shelter. Further, it was suggested to extend support to the inmates in convergence with different departments. The Committee suggested to arrange bed, lockers/wardrobes, more number of fans, drinking water facility with RO, clean & hygine toilet, CCTV camera and provide vocational training to the inmates to enhance their skills.

The Committee suggested to the Mission Directorate to depute an officer to visit the shelter and list out the requirement/ need of the shelter.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD UNDER THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF JUSTICE (RETD) KAILASH GAMBHIR, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS, CONSTITUTED AS PER ORDERS OF HON'BLE SUPREME COURT

Date: 11thMay 2017, Time:10:00AM Senate Hall, Hotel Capitol, Bengaluru



meeting of the A Committee was held at 10.00 A.M. on 11th May, 2017 in the Senate Hall of Hotel Capitol, Bengaluru to review the progress of shelters in the State. The meeting was under the convened Chairmanship of Justice (Retd.) Gambhir. List of Kailash

participants is *Annexed*. The Chairperson, at the outset, extended his warm welcome to all the participants. In his opening remarks he briefed the participants about scope of the work of the Committee as per the Orders of the Hon'ble Supreme Court for physical verification of shelters.

As desired by the Hon'ble Chairman, Dr.Vishal R, State Mission Director, DAY-NULM & Director of Municipal Administration, Government of Karnataka presented the progress of Shelters for Urban Homeless in the state. He referred to the guidelines and progress made so far from FY 2014-15 to 2017-18 in the State of Karnataka.

It was informed that 34 statutory towns have been selected for the implementation of Scheme of Shelters for Urban Homeless under DAY-NULM in Karnataka. The state has sanctioned 42 shelters (12 New, 3 refurbishment & 27 O&M) under DAY-NULM. Total 27 shelters are functioning in the State. Out of the total number, 6 shelters are managed by Bruhath Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) welfare fund and 21 are functional with the support of DAY-NULM.

Hon'ble Chairman stressed on conducting survey to identify the urban homeless. Homeless people on city streets are invisible to public policy, though they are visible daily to policy makers as they drive the same city streets. Many suffer and die in the bitter winter, the severe summer or in



the deluge of the monsoons. They are forced to live and sleep each night under the open sky. Their life is a continuous struggle against hunger and sickness. He briefed that, the number of urban homeless in Karnataka is 35,473 (census 2011). In Bengaluru the number of urban homeless is around 17,000 as per asurvey conducted by an NGO.

Hon'ble Chairman urged the State government to gather credible information about the number of urban homeless by conducting survey at the earliest, preferably by a third party. Further, he directed the state to prepare a road map for the establishment of shelters in a time bound manner. He also advised to utilise the unused space for expansion of existing shelters reputed NGOs/ social organizations may be given priority for entrusting responsibility of shelter management. Based on the information gathered during visit of shelters, he also asked the State Government to clear the pending bills of the Shelter Management Agencies.

Joint Secretary (JS), MoHUPA, Member, Committee advised the state go for bio-metric survey of homeless for capturing data systematically. The survey should be completed in three months. The road map for operationalization of shelter should include identified land parcels for the shelters. A convergence committee, including the other line departments need to be formed at the ULB level to supervise the functioning of the shelters. The shelter management agencies need to be trained in such a manner, that they can run the shelter as per the mandate of DAY-NULM. JS, MoHUPA, also stressed on third-party quality audit of shelters on quarterly basis by reputed educational institutions, social organisations, research organisations or IIMs and its observations need to be placed before the GC/ EC. He pointed out that unless Commissioners of Municipal Corporations & Executive Officers of the Municipalities provide leadership, it will be difficult to achieve the intended objectives. A dedicated team/cadre is required to closely monitor this component and review the progress on timely basis. He also suggested introducing ICT technology in the shelters with the facilities like-CCTV camera, computerized entry, online reporting of data.

Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, (ADJ.) Member Secretary of the Committee suggested that the requirements of the Shelter homes as per the given parameters need to be identified carefully. Refurbishment should be done properly, so that the respective Shelter Unit is brought under the ambit of DAY-NULM. He also suggested for imparting of shelter management skills to the shelter management agencies/organisations. Shelters should be linked with skill training courses under DAY-NULM or any other scheme available, which will help in improving the livelihoods of the Shelter inmates.

Hon'ble Chairman directed the state to submit a comprehensive roadmap for establishment of shelters by 2022 based on the estimated number of homeless in the State.

The following action points were suggested:

- Intensive urban homeless survey to be conducted for identification of urban homeless in all the ULBs;
- Shelters run by other departments as well unused government buildings may be refurbishment and brought under DAY-NULM;
- iii. Ensure functioning of shelters as per the NULM guidelines;
- iv. To conduct third party quality audit on a quarterly basis by engaging reputed institutions/organisations;
- v. Profile of the shelters to be uploaded on the NULM portal;

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- vi. To submit a roadmap containing the details of identified land parcels for establishment of required number of shelters by 2022;
- vii. Expedite the construction of the sanctioned shelters;
- viii. Converge all possible benefits of the Govt. schemes for mainstreaming the homeless;
 - Police (in plain dress) and para-legal volunteers need to visit to the shelter periodically;
 - Capacity Building programmes to be designed for the shelter management staff;
 - wide publicity of shelters needs to be made by the way of hoardings, display board and other means;
- xii. CCTV camera, computers and printers to be installed in all the shelters.
- xiii. Toll free number to be introduced as a helpline for the shelters; and
- xiv. Details of the shelters (both under NULM & Other than NULM) to be uploaded on the Ministry's website.

Shri Sanjeev Kumar, Additional Chief Secretary, Department of Skill Development, Entrepreneurship and Livelihood, Government of Karnataka assured the Committee about submission of roadmap for shelters up to 2022 and preparation of action plan for operationalization of the shelters in coordination with other departments.

Smt. Uma Mahadevan, Principal Secretary, Women & Child Development and Empowerment of Differently Abled and Senior Citizens Department, Government of Karnataka informed the Committee regarding the initiatives taken by the Department for welfare of women, children, persons with disabilities and senior citizens. She also shared the measures taken for operationalizing of 40 open shelters for the children with a capacity of 1000.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks by Dr.Vishal R, State Mission Director, DAY-NULM & Director of Municipal Administration, Government of Karnataka to the Chairman, Committee Members and all attendees.

OBSERVATION NOTE ON THE PHYSICAL VERIFICATION MADE BY THE COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS DATE: 10th May, 2017

Sheltersvisited in Bengaluru:

- 1. Shelter for Urban Homeless, BBMP Gymnasium Building, Rajaji Nagar.
- 2. Shelter for Urban Homeless, Dr. TCM Rayan Road, BBMP Office Building.
- Shelter for Urban Homeless, Bommanalli, Bengaluru.
- Shelter for Urban Homeless, Murphy town, Shivaji Nagar, Bengaluru.

Shelter for Urban Homeless, BBMP Gymnasium Building, Rajaji Nagar

The Committee visited a Shelter for Urban Homeless at BBMP Gymnasium Building, Rajaji Nagar for physical verification, supported by Bruhata Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike, Bengaluru. The shelter is functional with funding support from other than DAY-NULM. As

intimated, the capacity of the shelter is 16 and average occupancy is 12.Mostof the inmates are daily wage labourers or loader/un-loaders in nearby localities.The shelter is operational since 2012 in that building owned by BBMP. During the visit 12 inmates were present in the shelter. Peoples Action and Rural Development Society is engaged to run the shelter.



Observations:

- Pathway of the shelter area was very congested and the room size was approximately 20 ft. X 30 ft.
- Shelter has bed arrangements for its inmates.
- No food is being provided to the inmates.
- For recreation the shelter has a TV set.
- Poor locker/cupboard facility.
- No CCTV camera is installed.
- Though, it was intimated that periodic doctor visits for healthcheck-up of the inmates, but it was not recorded in any register.
- Drinking water connection (through Municipal Corporation) was available.

Two bathrooms were available in the shelter.



 Names entered in the attendance book, but the inmates were not present.

 Same inmates are staying only without any new inmates.

 Few registers are maintained, but the documentation and record keeping is poor.

 One shelter manger is engaged in the maintenance of the shelter.

The Committee members interacted with shelter residents& staff about the facilities provided and suggested to make the shelter NULM

compliant.During the visit, the local Ward Member informed that, the condition of shelter was not good. White-washing, arrangements of new beds, mattress, bed sheets, cleaning etchad been done only few days before. Further, she informed that, most of time teenagers and drunkards come to the shelter and indulge in activities like-drinking, shouting, merrymaking etc, which should not be allowed. It was also alleged that the shelter manager is collecting Rs.50 per day from the residents for staying in the shelter.

The Committee directed the state Govt. officials to look into the matter immediately and find out the truth. Any kind of illegal activities should not be allowed inside the premises of the shelter. Residents with alcohol, cigarettes and other tobacco products should be debarred. The profile of the inmates should be shared with local police station for verification and police (in plain dress) & para-legal volunteers need to visit to the shelter periodically.

Hon'ble Chairman directed the State Govt. officials to ensure the installation of CCTV cameras in all the shelters within 15 days, if there is no tendering process involved.

Shelter for Urban Homeless, Dr. TCM Rayan Road, BBMP Office Building

The Committee visited another shelter at Dr. TCM Rayan Road, BBMP Office Building. The shelter is funded by BruhataBengaluruMahanagaraPalike. Bengaluru.CURDDS (R), an NGO is in charge of managing this shelter for men. The capacity

of the shelter is 25. It was observed that most of the residents were travellers. The shelter manager, however, informed that most of the residents are working as loaders/unloaders, daily wage labour etc, who usually work at the nearby bus and railway station.

The building comprised of hall, washrooms and arrangements of



drinking water (Mineral water bottles)lights and fan facilities etc for the residents. One shelter coordinator was present during the visit. Though the shelter manger showed few registers, the documents were observed to be not maintained properly. The room was too congested for the residents and hardly there was any gap between the beds. Locker facilities were available in the shelter. It was observed that, the mattress, bed sheets, pillows, beds etc were quite new. The shelter manager informed that, all the articles were provided by BBMP two days back only. Joint Secretary, M/o HUPA inquired about the asset register to check the entry of goods, but the register was not maintained at the shelter. It was informed that,

BBMP has procured all the goods and supplied to the shelter. The organisation/NGO is engaged only for managing the shelter.

Hon'ble Chairman directed the State Govt. officials to expand the shelter as the adjacent room was vacant and the hall is crowded. State Govt. officials informed the committee about their plan to construct a four



storey building as a permanent shelter for urban homeless with all the facilities.

Shelter for Urban Homeless, Bommanalli, Bengaluru.

The Jambusavari Dinne Shelter of Bommanalli, Bengaluruis operational in a two storey building. The shelter is managed by the Non-Governmental Organisation, Surabhi supported by BBMP. Both male and female inmates are staying in the shelter. The capacity of the shelter is 40 and the average occupancy is 35. The shelter was equipped with beds, mattresses, lights, fan, drinking water, fire extinguisher etc. Separate and spacious bath rooms were attached to the shelter. The halls were spacious and well ventilated. Shelter home was also quite clean. The shelter has managed all the registers along including few for the residents regarding-BPL card & PDS, Old age, Widow & Disabled person, Inmates profile register etc. The profile register of the residents had around 43 fields of information along with the photograph of the inmate. Four staff was engaged in shelter management. It was informed that the shelter provides daily breakfast & tea to the inmates.

Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, Member Secretary, interacted with the residents & staff about the facilities provided in the shelter and suggested to make the shelter NULM compliant as per the guidelines. He suggested to install CCTV cameras and provide lockers to the inmates in the shelter.



Shelter for Urban Homeless, Murphy town, Shivaji Nagar, Bengaluru.

The Committee visited Shelter Home, Murphy town, Shivaji Nagar, Bengaluru for physical verification. The Shelter Unit caters for both male and female and managed by Sparsha Trust supported by BBMP. The Shelter is functioning in a two storey building. The capacity of the shelter is 60 and the average occupancy per day is around 40. It was informed that three blind persons are staying in the shelter. The building comprised of well-furnished halls with tiled floors, separate wash rooms, dining space, store room, bunk beds, mattress with TV and other recreation amenities. The shelter has a good arrangement of bedding, food, water supply, electricity, and other related rehabilitation measures for the inmates. As per the information, two shelter manger and two supervisors are engaged in the shelter. It was observed during the visit that, the shelter is maintaining the necessary registers.



The Members inquired their requirement by interacting with the Shelter Staff. The shelter is getting around Rs.65,000/- per month for the shelter management. It includes salaries of the staff, food for the inmates and shelter maintenance, etc. The shelter manager informed that most of the residents are labour, painter, beggar, rag-picker, loader etc. The shelter is providing one time meal

to the inmates at night. During day-time food is provided to the residents by the ISCON Trust. It was informed by the shelter manager that, medical check- up is done once in a month for the inmates.

Hon'ble Chairman directed the State Govt. officials to identify the requirements and extend support to the shelter unit under DAY-NULM.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD UNDER THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF JUSTICE (RETD) KAILASH GAMBHIR, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS, CONSTITUTED AS PER ORDERS OF HON'BLE SUPREME COURT

Date: 6th June, 2017, Time:10:15 AM Conference Hall, Department of Municipal Administration, Telangana



A meeting of the Committee was held at 10:15 A.M. on 6th June, 2017 in the Conference Hall of Department of Municipal

Administration, Telangana to review the progress of shelters in the State. The meeting was convened under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd.) Kailash Gambhir. List of participants is *Annexed*.

At the outset, Dr. T.K. Sreedevi, State Mission Director, DAY-NULM and Director of Municipal Administration & Mission Director, MEPMA welcomed Justice (Retd) Kailash Gambhir, Chairman, Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, Member Secretary and Shri. Sanjay Kumar Member of the Hon'ble Supreme Court constituted Committee on Shelter for Urban Homeless, and other participants from different line departments.

The Mission Director, MEPMA gave a presentation on status of Shelters and progress madeso far from FY 2014-15 to 2017-18. The survey of homeless has been completed in all 74 ULBs 3,571 homeless has been identified. 47 shelters are sanctioned by the Project Sanctioning Committee, out of which 22 are operational. The convergence activities like providing Aadhaar cards, Voter IDs, Pensions, Medical and Legal services to the needy persons and skill training to the eligible inmates are taken up in these shelters. The Social auditalso isbeing conducted for the functioning shelters by the concerned Town Level Federations of Women in the ULB.

The Mission Director explained the process of updation of details of shelters on Google map, details of inmates and process of capturing biometric attendance of inmates in the State.



The Commissioner, Khammam Municipal Corporation explained about the shelter, which is functioning in Govt. Hospital premises in Khammam. Meals @ Rs. 5/- have been arranged for the inmates of shelter.

The Secretary, Women & Child Development Department informed that at presentthere are **33 Children Homes**(30 for Girls and 3 for Boys)are functioning in the state for the abandoned children and orphans.**Five Ujjwala Homes** are being maintained (*with the support of NGOs*) for the female victims of trafficking. **Swaadhar Grehs** are maintained for the destitute and homeless women. Vocational Training is offered to the inmates in those homes for their economic development.

The representatives from CCS (Campaign for Citizen Shelters), a network of NGOs who are operating shelters in Greater Hyedrabad Municipal Corporation(GHMC) area suggested that;

- Minimum wage act should be implemented for the Shelter Managers and care takers of shelters;
- Shelters for Urban Homeless to be integrated to the nearby Anganwadi Centers;
- Shelters (Hostel Model) with a minimum user fee are to be established for homeless person who can afford to shift from Shelters (DAY-NULM) before mainstreaming into the Society;
- Cremation facilities to be provided for the deceased homeless persons.
- Centralised Help desk for providing legal services for the inmates, especially victimised women & girls.

The Commissioner, GHMC, informed that the Shelters for Urban Homeless in GHMC area are working successfully with the support of NGOs and Govt. collaboration.

The Secretary, MA&UD Dept, Telangana informed that the Action Plan has been prepared for the next 5 years (2017-2022) to establish 38 new shelters in the State.

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The Chairman briefed the participants about the scope of the work of the Committee as per Orders of Hon'ble Supreme Court i.e. to visit the ULBs for physical verification of shelters. He further urged that the State government should have credible information regarding the number of urban homeless. Unless proper mapping is done, it is difficult to get the actual number of the urban homeless. The survey of urban homeless needs to be conducted preferably by a third-party agency.

The Chairman made the following suggestions on the functioning of shelters:

- Survey for urban homeless has to be conducted preferably by a third party in all the 74 ULBs;
- ii. All shelters should comply with the guidelines of DAY-NULM;
- iii. Necessary documentation eg. Aadhar, Voter id, White Ration Card and health cards should be arranged so that they can access the government schemes and services;
- Coolers and RO water facility to be provided in the shelters;
- Basic training on medicines and administering first-aid needs to be given to theshelter staff;
- vi. To establish a separate help desk for Shelters which should also aid in grievance redressal;
- vii. Regular/periodical health checkups for the inmates;
- viii. Police in plain dress should visit to the Shelters to prevent any untoward incidents;
 - ix. Legal help should be provided to the needy inmates by convergence with Telangana State Legal Services Authority;

- It is noticed that the girls living in the juvenile home are willing to go back to their home. Action to be taken for reuniting the willing children with their parents;
- xi. Anganwadi services should be extended to the inmates of the shelters;
- xii. Converge all possible benefits of the Govt. schemes for mainstreaming the homeless;
- xiii. Complete the construction or refurbishment of the sanctioned shelters at the earliest and operationalize them;
- xiv. Create awareness activities on availability of shelter by announcement/display at railway stations, bus-stands and other important places;
- Toll-free number and help desk need to be introduced;
- xvi. Computer with internet facility, recreation facilities, TV with cable connection to be provided in shelters;
- xvii. CCTV Cameras to be installed for effective monitoring and to checkillegal activities if any in the shelters;
- xviii. To explore possibility of providing subsidized meals @ Rs.5/inthe shelters in GHMC area under existing government scheme.

Joint Secretary, MoHUPA informed about the recent amendments made to the SUH guidelines i.e. incase of the non-availability of suitable land in the citiess for shelters near the places of congregation of homeless, hiring of buildings on rent for running of shelters has been permitted as a stop-gap arrangement till 2022. Efforts, however, need to be made by the States/ UTs to provide permanent shelters to homeless by the year 2022 as per DAY-NULM guidelines.

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He stressed on conducting of a bio-metric survey to assess the number of preferably by a third party agency. The road map for shelters should include identified land parcels for the shelters. A convergence committee, including the other line departments needs to be formed at the ULB level so that, all possible support and services can be provided to the inmates of the shelters. The shelter management agencies need to be trained in such a manner, that they can run the shelter the mandate of the mission.

JS, MoHUPA, also stressed on third-party audit of shelters on a quarterly basis by a reputed educational institute, organisation or research organisation, and observations should put up before the Project Sanctioning Committee. He pointed out that Commissioners of Municipal Corporations & Executive Officers of the Municipality should lead this scheme for success. A dedicated team/cadre should be put in place to closely monitor and review the progress on a weekly basis. He also suggested to introduce ICT technology in the shelter with the facilities like-CCTV camera, computerized data entry and online reporting.He furthermade following suggestions:

- Constitution of Executive Committee in all the ULBs under the Chairmanship of concerned Municipal Commissioner as per the mission guidelines;
- Arrangements to be made for provision of residence proof for the shelter inmates which is essential for getting Adhaar Card, Voter ID, Ration card etc;

iii. Project Sanctioning Committee is empowered to approve the O&M cost for the shelter. There is not limit for Operation & Maintenance Cost of Shelter for Urban Homeless.

Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, Member Secretarysuggested that the state machinery as well as Shelter Management Agencies should think of income generation activities of inmates. The shelters should be linked with skill training facilities under DAY-NULM or any other scheme available, which will help in improving the livelihoods of the shelter inmates.

Hon'ble Chairman directed the state to submit a comprehensive roadmap for establishment of shelters by 2022 based on the estimated number of homeless in the State. The Committee has opined that all line departments should coordinate for convergence activities to improve the living status of the inmates.

The meeting was concluded with a vote of thanks by Dr. T.K. Sreedevi, State Mission Director, DAY-NULM and Director of Municipal Administration & Mission Director, MEPMA, Government of Telangana.

- Shelter for Urban Homeless Women, Namalagundu, Secundarabad-18, Hyderabad.
- Special cum Observation Home, Department of Juvenile Welfare, 3-1-818 Nimboliadda Chaderghat Railway Bridge.

Shelter for Urban Homeless,Oppisite Begumpet Railway Station, Secundarabad-18, Hyderabad.

The Committee visited a Shelter for Urban Homeless situated oppisite Begumpet Railway Station, Secundarabad-18, Hyderabadfor physical verification. The shelter is functional with DAY-NULM (O&M) support. Amanvedika, an NGO is the Shelter Management Agency

managing the shelter. As intimated, while the capacity of the shelter is 50 and average occupancy is 32. The inmates are mostly working as daily wage labour or work of a similar kind in nearby localities. The shelter has



different committees to manage the discipline in the shelter.

- Shelter is running under an over-bridge. Roof is very high and thus lacks proper cooling atmosphere.
- Shelter has bed arrangements for its inmates.
- There is space for reading newspapers and books.
- Food is being provided to the inmates.
- For recreation, the shelter has a TV set and other facilities.

- Locker/cupboard facilities are poorly maintained.
- CCTV camera has been installed.
- Drinking water connection (through Municipal Corporation) is available.
- Two bathrooms are available in the shelter.
- There is proper maintenance of books of records.
- Biometric attendance system has been introduced.
- Kitchen space is available with adequate utensils and cutleries
- One shelter manger and three care takers are engaged in the maintenance of the shelter.

The Committee members discussed with the inmates & staff about the facilities provided in the shelter and suggested to make the shelter NULM compliant as per the guideline. The bath rooms should be cleaned regularly and enabled with flush facilities for maintaining better hygine. The Committee suggested to the shelter coordinators to ensure RO water facilities and proper wardrobes to the inmates. **Hon'ble Chairman**directed the State Govt. officials to provide coolers and computer to the shelter.

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Shelter for Urban Homeless Women, Namalagundu, Secundarabad-18,



Hyderabad.

The Committee visited Shelter for Urban Homeless Women, Namalagundu, Secundarabad-18,

Hyderabadand suggested that the shelter unit should be made fully compliant with

DAY-NULM guidelines. The shelter is functional with DAY-NULM (O&M) support. Amanvedika, an NGO is the Shelter Management Agency managing the shelter. As intimated, the capacity of the shelter was 30 and at the time of visit 22 women inmates were staying in the shelter. Mostly the inmates are working as maid servants, attendants, sales girl or similar kind of occupation in nearby localities. The shelter is also providing tailoring training to its inmates to enhance their livelihoods. It was observed that few of the girls/women are victims of domestic violence.

The shelter has arrangement of bedding, water supply, electricity, facilities for vocational education and first aid facilities for its inmates. As per the information, one manager and three care giversare engaged in the shelter for its management.

The members enquired from shelter staff and inmates about their requirement. The shelter coordinator expressed about requirements of food arrangements, care for newly born babies, skill training for inmates, provision of ration cards etc. The Committee directedState Govt. officials



to provide legal education and support to the inmates. If required, the complaint should be lodged against the culprit. Special screening for skill training should be arranged for the inmates of the shelters under EST&T

component or other scheme of the State Government. Food at subsidised rate may be provided to the inmates in convergence with State Govt. Schemes.Special arrangements may be made in convergence with Women & Child Development Department for extending support to the shelter through Anganwadi Centres.The Committee also advised the State Govt. officials to provide ration to the shelter through Civil Supplies Department.

Special cum Observation Home, Department of Juvenile Welfare, 3-1-818 Nimboliadda Chaderghat Railway Bridge.

The Special cum Observation Home, Chaderghat is operatedby Department of Juvenile Welfare, Telangana. The capacity of the shelter is 100 and at the time of visit around 76 inmates were staterd to be staying in the shelter. The shelter was well equipped with beds, mattress, lights, fan, drinking water, space for recreation etc. Separate and spacious bath rooms were attached to the shelter. The halls were spacious and well ventilated. Shelter home was also quite clean. The shelter has managed the registers along with separate profile registers for the inmates according to their age and gender. Three Superintendents, one Deputy Superintendent and other support staff are engaged in shelter management. It was informed that the shelter provides daily food to the inmates. The inmates are also engaged in different kind of vocational training like- tailoring, making home decore items, bangles, toys etc. The shelter is also taking care of the education of the inmates. Periodicity of medical check ups is done in every 15 days for the shelter inmates.

The Committee members discussed with the children & staff about the facilities provided in the shelter and suggested to make the shelter DAY-NULM compliant as per the guideline. The shelter Superintendent shared case history of few of the inmates who were either abandoned, victims of domestic violence, child marriage etc and told that each and every inmates has her own story. The Committee suggested State Govt. officials to provide legal education and support to the inmates.If

required, FIR should be lodged against the culprit. While interacting , the committee mebers noticed that the girls living in the Juvenile



Home are willing to go back to their home. The Committee also suggested to bring the issues to Child Welfare Committee (CWC) to deal with matters concerning children. **Hon'ble Chairman** suggested to take action for reuniting the willing children with their parents. Possibilities to be find out on case to case basis. The Committee further suggests for arranging special screening of skill training for the inmates of the shelters under EST&T component or other scheme of the State Government.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD UNDER THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF JUSTICE (RETD) KAILASH GAMBHIR, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON SHELTERS FOR URBAN HOMELESS, CONSTITUTED AS PER ORDERS OF HON'BLE SUPREME COURT

DATE: 16th June, 2017

A meeting was held at 11.00 A.M. on 16th June, 2017 at Conference Hall, Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation, Ahmedabad, Gujarat under



the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd.) Kailash Gambhir to monitor the performance of shelters functional in Gujarat. List of attendees of the meeting is *Annexed*.

The meeting started with a

warm welcome to the Committee members by Shri Poonamchand Parmar, Additional Chief Secretary, Urban Development & Urban Housing Department. He informed the committee members that, Gujarat Government has adequate policies for slum dwellers and the houseless. Mukhyamantri Amrutum Yojana provides tertiary care treatment to Below Poverty Line (BPL) population & to the families having an annual income Rs. 1.50 lakh or below per annum.

Smt. Praveena D.K., Mission Director Gujarat Urban Livelihoods Mission made a presentation on Shelter for Urban Homeless Scheme being implemented from FY 2014-15 to 2017-18 in the State. It was informed that the total urban population of Gujarat is around 2.52 crore and the number of urban homeless is 83,306. Since FY 2014-15, 10 shelters have been sanctioned and out of that 5 shelters are operational under DAY-NULM. Total 212 shelters (including shelters of DAY-NULM, Night Shelters, child home, observation homes and specialised adoption agencies of other departments) are operational with a capacity of 12,988. She said that the newly constructed shelter at Rajkot is a model shelter having required amenities as per the SUH guidelines. The shelter is in a four-storey building with a capacity of 448 (equal capacity for men & women).

The Municipal Commissioners of Ahmedabad, Rajkot, Gandhinagar, Bhavnagar, Surat, Vadodara, Jamnagar, Junagadh appraised the status of shelters, key



challenges and plans to operationalize the shelters in their respective cities. Municipal Commissioner, Ahmedabad suggested to engage dedicated staff for shelter management, instead of entrusting shelter management to NGOs/organizations. JS (UPA) informed that, Project Sanction Committee of the state is authorized to take decision for proper management of shelters as per the SUH guidelines.

Hon'ble Chairman briefed the participants about the scope of the work of the Committee as per Orders of the Hon'ble Supreme Court i.e. to cause physical verification of the shelters for urban homeless in each State /UT, whether the shelters are in compliance with the SUH guidelines and also to find out the reasons for slow progress, non-utilization of funds, diversion/ mis-utilization of funds. He shared his observations about 4 shelters visited on 15th June, 2017 in Ahmedabad. It was observed that, all the 4 shelters don't comply with SUH guidelines.

The two shelter homes managed by an NGO, "Manav Seva Santha" at Giridharnagar and Madhupura road are in extremely bad condition. It was found that the shelters were not clean and hygienic and didn't have basic amenities like wash basin, clean bathrooms and flush system. The shelter had only one register which was not maintained properly and staff managing the shelters was not trained.

The Hon'ble Chairman stated that the presentation of the Mission Director is showing lack of progress in establishment of permanent shelters for the homeless. In fact, the availability of functional shelters has come down as compared to the numbers given in the affidavit submitted by the state in the Supreme Court in the FY 2014-15. State Government should focus on operationalization of shelters with proper shelter management. He suggested to refurbish the shelters of other agencies to make them compliant with the SUH guidelines of DAY-NULM.

The Chairman further stated that a survey of urban homeless has to be done preferably a third party. Location of shelters should be near the places of congregation of homeless people. The Project Sanctioning Committee is empowered to take a decision for sanctioning appropriate O&M costs and take rented buildings to house the homeless. The shelters should maintain proper records as per the DAY-NULM guidelines, preferably digitized records should be maintained in computers. He advised to make arrangements for biometric attendance and CCTV cameras.

The Chairman further stated that every shelter should have a Shelter Management Committee and the town should have an Executive Committee along with the representatives of the homeless and the civil society at ULB level, as mandated by the mission guidelines. The shelter management agency should be given adequate skill training for maintaining the shelters. Complete profile of the inmates should be maintained and the data pertaining to the functional shelters should be uploaded on the National as well as State Portal.

Joint Secretary, MoHUPA, Member, Committee stressed on conducting of a survey at the earliest, preferably a bio-metric survey for capturing data systematically. The road map of shelters should include identified land parcels for the shelters. A convergence committee, including other line departments needs to be formed at the ULB level so that the requisite support and services can be provided to the inmates of the shelters. Capacity building of the shelter management agencies is required so that they can run the shelter as per the mission guidelines. He further suggested for selecting the shelter management agencies based on their capacity and past track record instead of the present practice of least cost tendering. He observed that the shelters are not only to lodge the homeless but is a place to converge all scheme benefits meant for them to mainstream them.

JS(UPA) further informed that, in case of the non-availability of suitable land for construction of shelters near to the places of concentration of homeless, hiring of buildings for running of shelters has been permitted as a stop-gap arrangement till 2022. Efforts need to be made by the States/UTs to provide permanent shelters to homeless by the year 2022 as per DAY-NULM guidelines. The road map for shelter should include identified land parcels for construction of shelters.

Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, (ADJ.) Member Secretary of the Committee stressed on preparing a realistic plan for operationalization of shelters and submit the road map at the earliest. Strategic awareness activities need to be taken so that the beneficiaries will come to know about the shelters and the benefits available. State machinery as well as Shelter Management Agencies should think of income generation activities of inmates.

The committee further suggested the following action points:

- Urban homeless survey to be conducted for identification of urban homeless in all the ULBs;
- Shelters run by municipal corporations to be refurbished to make them NULM compliant;
- Based on the survey, shelters are to be established either through refurbishing the existing buildings/Non-NULM shelters or by new construction;
- iv. To conduct third party quality audit on a quarterly basis by engaging reputed institutions/organisations;
- v. To submit a roadmap for establishment of required number of shelters by 2022;
- vi. Expedite the construction of the sanctioned shelters under DAY-NULM and make them operational.
- vii. Develop a mechanism in consultation with health department for periodical health checkup of shelter inmates;
- viii. Converge all possible benefits of the Govt. schemes for mainstreaming the homeless;
 - ix. Police (in plain dress) and para-legal volunteers need to visit to the shelters periodically.

- Capacity Building programmes for Shelter Staff should be conducted for effective functioning of shelters;
- wide publicity of shelters needs to be made by the way of creating jingles, hoardings and other means of publicity.
- xii. Shelter should maintain records in computerised form;
- xiii. Toll free number and help desk may be introduced for the shelter and information of the shelters (both under NULM & Other than NULM) to be uploaded on the Ministry's website.

Shri Poonamchand Parmar, Additional Chief Secretary, Urban Development & Urban Housing Department assured the Hon'ble Chairman and other members of the Committee that state will submit the roadmap for establishment of required number of shelters by 2022 and prepare the plan of action for operationalization of the shelter in coordination with other departments. He instructed to all the Municipal Commissioners to visit the urban homeless concentration areas of their ULB and submit plan for required number of shelters. He informed that survey of urban homeless will start soon and existing shelters will be made compliant with DAY-NULM guidelines. He suggested the officials to develop a model ToR to hire the reputed organisation/NGOs for shelter management and assured that the Government will take all necessary steps to follow the guidelines of DAY-NULM & also suggestions/directions given by the Committee.

The meeting was concluded with a vote of thanks by Shri Mukesh Kumar, Municipal Commissioner, Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation, Government of Gujarat to the Chairperson and all attendees.

Shelter for Urban Homeless, Under Over Bridge, Giridhar Nagar

The Committee visited a Shelter for Urban Homeless under over bridge, Giridhar Nagar area for physical verification, run by Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation, Gujarat. An NGO named as "Manav Seva Santha", is in charge of managing this shelter. As intimated, the capacity of the shelter is 60 (*male &Female*) and average accupancy is 18. Mostly the



inmates are working as labourer or similar kind of work in the localities. The organisation is receiving Rs.20/- for each inmate (*per day*) those who are staying in the shlter. The shelter is operational in the Municipal Corporation building. During the visit there were no inmates present in the shelter.

- Shlter home is not in clean condition;
- Shelter has two halls;
- Shelter has no bed arrangements for its inmates;
- No food is being provided to the inmates;
- For recreation the shelter has no arrangements;
- No locker/cupboard facility;
- No CCTV camera is installed;
- Drinking water connection (through Municipal Corporation) is available;
- Two bath rooms (without flush facilities) are available in the shelter;
- No basin in the shelter;

- Only one attendance register is maintained but the documentation & record keeping is poor;
- One staff is engaged for maintenance of the shelter.

The Committee members discussed with r the SMA staff and officials & suggested to make the shelter compliant with SUH guideline of DAY-NULM. The Committee also suggested that the toilets/bath rooms should have flush facilities. This will help in maintaining hygiene in the



shelter. The Committee directed the representative of Shelter Management Agency to maintain all the records properly and the shelter should be under the survilance of adequate number of CCTVs.

Shelter for Urban Homeless, Madhupura Road Store, Shahibag



The Committee visited another shelter for Urban Homeless at Madhupura Road Store, Shahibag for physical verification. The shelter is run by Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation, Gujarat. "Manav Seva Santha", an NGO is in charge of managing this shelter. The capacity of the shelter is 60 and average accupancy number is 16. Mostly the inmates (*men & women*) are working as labourer or similar kind of work in the localities. The organisation is receiving Rs.20/- for each inmates (*per day*) those who are staying in the shlter. The shelter is operational in the

Municipal Corporation building. During the visit there were 4 inmates were present in the shelter. The building comprised of two halls including attached wash rooms.

- Shlter home is not in clean condition;
- Shelter has two halls;
- Shelter has no bed arrangements for its inmates;
- No food is being provided to the inmates;
- For recreation the shelter has no arrangements;
- No locker/cupboard facility;
- No CCTV camera is installed;

- Drinking water connection (through Municipal Corporation) is available;
- Two bath rooms (without flush facilities) are available in the shelter;
- No basin in the shelter;
- Only one attendance register is maintained but the documentation & record keeping is poor;
- One staff is engaged for maintenance of the shelter.

The Committee members discussed with the SMA staff and officials and suggested to make the shelter NULM compliant as per the guideline. The Committee also suggested that the toilets/bath rooms should have flush facilities. This will help in maintaining hygiene in the shelter. The Committee visited shelter for Urban Homeless at Plot No-470, Opposite Bhagwati Floor Mill, Naroda, for physical verification. The shelter is run by Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation, Gujarat. "Ranjit Social Trust", an NGO is in charge of managing this



shelter. The capacity of the shelter is 60 and average accupancy number is 45. Mostly the inmates (*men & women*) are working as labourer, cook, maid or similar kind of work in the localities. The organisation is receiving Rs.20/- for each inmates (*per day*) those who are staying in the shlter. The shelter is operational in the Municipal Corporation

Building. During the visit there were 6 inmates were present in the shelter. The building comprised of two halls and separate wash rooms.

- Shiter home has good building and infrastructure;
- Halls are comparatively clean;
- Shelter has bed arrangements for its inmates without cot;
- Food is being provided to the inmates;

- For recreation the shelter has space;
- No locker/cupboard facility;
- No CCTV camera is installed;
- Shelter has separate kitchen room;
- Shelter has separate office/care taker room;
- Drinking water connection (through Municipal Corporation) is available;
- Adequate number of bath rooms (without flush facilities) and wash basins are available in the shelter;

"Rahi Foundation", an NGO is in charge of managing this shelter. The capacity of the shelter is 60 and average accupancy number is 27. Mostly the inmates (*men*



& women) are working as labourer, cook, maid-servant or similar kind of work in the localities. The organisation is receiving Rs.20/- for each inmates (per day) those who are staying in the shlter. The shelter is operational in the Municipal Corporation Building. During the visit there were 8 inmates were present in the shelter. The building comprised of two halls and separate wash rooms.

- Shlter home has good building and infrastructure;
- Halls are comparatively clean, but bathrooms are stinky;

- Shelter has bed arrangements for its inmates without cots;
- Food is being provided to the inmates;
- For recreation the shelter has space;
- No locker/cupboard facility;
- No CCTV camera is installed;
- Shelter has separate kitchen room;
- Shelter has separate office/care taker room;
- Drinking water connection (through Municipal Corporation) is available;
- Adequate number of bath rooms (without flush facilities) and wash basins are available in the shelter;
- Only one attendance register is maintained but the documentation & record keeping is poor;



One staff is engaged for maintenance of the shelter;

A meeting of the Committee was held under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd.) Kailash Gambhir at 11.30 A.M. on 7thJune, 2017 in the



Conference Hall of Hotel the Gateway, Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh to review the progress of shelters in the State. List of participants is *Annexed*.

The meeting was started with welcome to the Committee and other participants. **The Mission Director** made a presentation on Shelter for Homeless Scheme being implemented from FY 2014-15 to 2017-18 in Andhra Pradesh.

The Principal Secretary to Government, MA&UD Department in his welcome address explained about the Family Business Plans and the activities of MEPMA that are being implemented in the State of Andhra Pradesh and expressed the need to implement the Housing schemes for the people living in slums.

The Commissioner of Police shared his experiences while tackling with the homeless people, who sleep on roadside pavements, parks, bus stands, railway stations etc. and are vulnerable to crime, assaults and



prone to accidents. Accommodating such people in Shelters would help in bring down the crime rate and their lives can also be safeguarded.

Sri Pragada

Sreenivas, representative of NGO, AUTD, GVMC shared his experiences regarding startinga shelter in Visakhapatnam in the year 2012-13. Now, they are running 3 shelters and have started a practice of rescuing and bringing the homeless to the shelters. He stated that the healthy inmates in shelters generally express their reluctance to stay with the inmates having diseases such as TB / HIV / leprosy and also the drug addicts. An institution named **VIZAG Smiles** is providing food to the inmates of the shelters. He felt that a review by a State Level Monitoring Committee should be done on the Scheme at least twice in a year, and also the Municipal Commissioners need to take special interest in the scheme.

Sri Shaik Basheer, NGO, Nellore informed that the representatives of District Legal Services Authority frequently visit the shelters run by the NGO in Nellore and give their valuable suggestions.

Sri Murali Krishna of Guide Foundation, Vijayawada expressed that training of all stakeholders is required for implementation of guidelines of NULM.

Sri Roshan Kumar, NGO, SEEDS, Guntur stated that active participation of Municipal Commissioners in running the Shelters for Homeless is essential. He also expressed that categorization of the inmates of the shelters needs to be done and shelters should be made available accordingly viz:

(1) Physically fit men, women and children.

(2) Families

(3) Old men & Women

(4) Persons with chronic diseases like TB / HIV / Drug Addicts etc.

Sri Srinivasan, **Project Director, GVMC** informed that they have collaborated with HUDCO as their Commissioner has taken special interest in this Scheme and with their General Funds, they are providing food to the inmates of shelters in Visakhapatnam with a tie-up of Akshaya Patra, a voluntary organization. Further the GVMC is also planning to take buildings on rental basis for running the Shelters for Urban Homeless.

Hon'ble Chairman Justice (Retd) Kailash Gambhir expressed his appreciation for the Family Business Plan being implemented in the state, and requested the Joint Secretary to study the same and explore the scope to replicating it else where.He briefed the participants about the scope of work of the Committee i.e.to cause physical verification of the available shelters for urban homeless w.r.t. their compliance with the SUH guidelines and also to find out reasons for slow progress, nonutilization/ diversion/ mis-utilization of funds. He has stated that in most of the shelters, the guidelines of Hon'ble Supreme Court are not fully implemented. It should be ensured that 44 functional shelters in the State of Andhra Pradesh should comply with the DAY-NULM guidelines.

The Chairman further stated that the survey of urban homeless needs to be done as mandated in the mission guidelines. The concentration of homeless people should decide about the location of shelters. He further informed that the MoHUPA has agreed for making enabling provisions in the guidelines for taking the buildings on rent for running the Shelters. The Project Sanctioning Committee is empowered to take decisions regarding admissible O&M costs. The Shelters should have biometric attendance, CCTV cameras and computers with web cameras to record the details of the inmates.

The Chairman further observed that shelter should have a Shelter Management Committee and the city should have an Executive Committee to oversee the functioning of shelters. If such committees are not formed, immediate action need to be taken for constitution of the same. The shelter management agency should undergo capacity building for maintaining the shelters. Shelters for men and women should be maintained separately. Profile of the inmates should be maintained and data pertaining to functional Shelters should be uploaded on the National as well as State Portal.

The Chairman also welcomed the idea of categorization of inmates as – differently abled and sick so as to accommodate them in the homes run by different Government Institutions. The Chairman instructed to create a help desk for this purpose at the State Level.

He appreciated the commendable job done by the NGOs and initiatives of the State Government. He also opined that if the NGOs are

financially supported they can run the shelters smoothly and instructed that outstanding dues if any, to the NGOs should be paid at the earliest. The suggestions/issues raised by the NGO representatives should be considered/ addressed by the Mission Directorate as per norms.

Shri Sanjay Kumar, Joint Secretary,MoHUPA, Member, Committee appreciated the concept of Family Business Plan taken up in the State and asked the Mission Director to share the plan with the Ministry for exploring possibility of its replication. He advised that, special shelters should be planned for the beggars / leprosy / HIV patients, where regular medical treatment shall be available. Rehabilitation plan for homeless should be explored on the lines of Family Business Plan. Priority should be given to the homeless people, who are poorest to join the shelters as compared to the people who are earning enough money for a living.

JS urged the authorities to consider amending the Master Plans of the Towns, so as to allocate places for shelters as per guidelines. He opined that the Municipal Commissioner is the person to lead the Executive Committee of his town and is responsible for the successful running of the shelters. Capacity Building of the Shelter Management Committee is for successful running of the shelters. He stressed on the need of organizing regular health camps and having convergences with the Urban Health Centers and for deputing Doctors to the Shelters for periodic health checkup of the inmates. The Joint Secretary also informed that while there is no time limit on stay for inmates in the shelters.

Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, Member Secretary, Committee stated that categorization of healthy and unhealthy inmates should be done. The minimum wages for personnel managing the Shelter should be ensured by the state.

The committee further suggested the following action points:

- Urban homeless survey to be conducted for identification of urban homeless in all the ULBs;
- Shelters run by other departments may be refurbished to make them NULM compliant;
- iii. Action required for ensuring the functioning of shelters as per the DAY-NULM guidelines;
- iv. Based on the survey, shelters are to be established either through refurbishing the existing buildings/Non-NULM shelters in compliance with DAY-NULM guidelines or by new construction;
- v. Third party quality audit needs to be conducted on a quarterly basis by engaging reputed institutions/organisations;
- vi. To submit a roadmap for establishment of required number of shelters in state by 2022;
- vii. Expedite the construction work of the sanctioned shelters under DAY-NULM and make them operational at the earliest.
- viii. Converge all possible benefits of the Govt. schemes for mainstreaming the homeless;
 - ix. Police (in plain dress) and para-legal volunteers needs to visit the shelter periodically.
 - Capacity Building programmes for shelter staff should be conducted for effective functioning of shelters;

- wide publicity of shelters needs to be made by way erecting hoardings and other means of publicity.
- xii. Shelter should maintain records in a computerised form;
- xiii. Toll free number and help desk may be introduced for the shelter and information of the shelters (both under NULM & Other than NULM) to be uploaded in the Ministry's website.

The Principal Secretary, MA&UD Department thanked Hon'ble Chairman and other members of the Committee for visiting the State of Andhra Pradesh and giving valuable suggestions on the Shelters for Urban Homeless people. He assured that the Government will take all necessary steps to follow the guidelines of DAY-NULM and also suggestions/directions given by the Committee.

DAY-I: 6th June, 2017

<u>NirasrayulakuAvasa</u> <u>Gruham, Shelter for</u> <u>Urban</u> <u>Homeless, Hanuman</u> <u>Peta</u>

The Committee visited NirasrayulakuAvasa Gruham, Shelter for Urban Homeless, Thirumala Rao street, near CPM Office, Hanuman Petasupported for refurbishment under DAY-NULM. The two storey shelter is maintained by an NGO, Guide Foundation For Development with the capacity for 100 (50 for each storey) men. The building comprised of well-furnished hall, wash rooms, store room, caretaker's room, beds for inmates, lockers, first-aid kit with recreation amenities. During the visit there were 18 inmates present in the shelter. As per records, a total of 103 Aadhar cards had been issued to the inmates.

The shelter has good arrangement of bedding, water supply, electricity, health care & counseling and other related rehabilitation measures for the inmates. As per the information, one shelter manger, three caretakers were working in the shelter. The shelter was found maintaining necessary registers and documents.

During the visit the Committee observed that the hall is too congested due to which there was very less space in between the beds. The Committee suggested addressing this issue immediately and bed arrangements need to be done in such a way so that adequate space is provided and hall is not over-crowded.

The Committee suggested that the bath/wash rooms should have flush facilities. This will help for maintaining hygiene in the shelter. The Committee directed the representative of Shelter Management Agency to maintain all the records in a computer in digitized form. The shelter should be under the surveillance of CCTV.

The Members of the Committee handpicked and interviewed a few of the inmates who shared information regarding their daily routine and how the shelter is helpful for them.

NirasrayulakuAvasaGruham, Shelter for Urban Homeless,

Ranigarithota

The Committee visited NirasrayulakuAvasaGruha m, Shelter for Urban Homeless, Near Water Tank, Ranigarithota for



physical verification. The shelter is maintained by an NGO, **Guide Foundation For Development.** The capacity of the shelter is 100 and at the time of visit, around 50 inmates were staying. The shelter is running in a temporary building, where as the new construction is about to complete.

The building comprised of well-furnished hall, wash rooms, cots for inmates with other requisite facilities. The shelter has good



arrangement of bunker bedding, food, water supply electricity, health care &counselling and other related measures for the inmates. As per the information, one shelter manager, three caretakers were working in the shelter. The shelter is maintaining necessary registers and other necessary documents

manually. A total of 112 Aadhar cards have been issued to the inmates.

The Members enquired their requirement by interacting with the Shelter Staff as well as inmates. The Committee suggested to the shelter coordinators to ensure RO water facility and wardrobes to the inmates.There was also very less space in between the beds. The Committee suggested addressing this issue immediately so as to avoid overcrowding of space.

The Committee suggested that the toilets/bath rooms should have flush facilities. This will help for maintaining hygiene in the shelter. The Committee directed the representative of Shelter Management Agency to maintain all the records in a computer in digitized form. The shelter should also be under the surveillance of adequate number of CCTVs.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD WITH STATE GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

Date: 4th May 2017, Time:3.30 PM Secretariat Conference Hall, Aizawl

A meeting was convened on 4th of May 2017 at Secretariat Conference Hall, Aizawl, under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd.) Kailash Gambhir. List of participants is attached as *Annexure-I*. Hon'ble Chairman briefed the participants about scope of the work of the Committee as per the orders of the Hon'ble Supreme Court for physical verification of sheltersand keeping in view the same the Committee is to visit the states and ULBs for physical verification of shelters.Thereafter, Dr. C. Vanlalramsanga, Secretary to the Government of Mizoram, UD&PA Dept. briefed the progress of Shelters for Urban Homeless in the state Mizoram.

As desired by the Hon'ble Chairman, Shri HVL Zarzoenga, Project Director, DAY-NULM, Directorate of UD&PA, Government of Mizoram presented the progress report on implementation of Scheme



of Shelter for Urban Homeless (SUH) component of DAY-NULM in Mizoram.

Survey of Homeless was conducted in the year 2011 with Local Councils in Aizawl City Area and 12 persons were identified as homeless. However, re-identification of the status of these 12 persons was carried out by Urban Development and Poverty Alleviation Department in the month of April, 2012.Out of the identified 12 persons, 9 persons are confirmed as physically and mentally challenged, who slept on the street side area of the city.

It was informed that Project Sanctioning Committee (PSC) has been convened seven times since the inception of DAY-NULM in Mizoram and a total60 shelters have been sanctioned (9 new and 51 refurbishment) under DAY-NULM. Out of these49 shelters are functional. The status of new constructions were also presented as per which construction of 1 shelter has been completed. Hon'ble Chairman made an appeal to the State Urban Mission to conduct a comprehensive surveyto indentifyhomeless and take appropriate steps for establishment of shelters by coordinating with line departments. Wherever land availability is an issue, he suggested for construction of shelters with vertical designs and to consider porta cabins to solve the issues. Hon'ble Chairman expressed his satisfaction on the role being played by the NGOs in running different types of shelters in the state. Hon'ble Chairman suggested for refurbishing the existing functional shelters to comply with the DAY-NULM guidelines and also to

develop a state portal to upload the shelter profiles and establish city wide help-line to be provided for facilitating the homeless. Furher he suggested that, intellectual ability of children residing in the shelters needs to be found out by the specialist and other agencies/departments should extend the helping hands for proper coordination and rehabilitation of inmates.



Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, (ADJ.) Member Secretary, on the issue relating to availability of repetitive support for refurbishment, advised that in case of the need there should not be problem of providing repetitive refurbishment support to the shelters. However the requirement of the Shelter home as per the parameter needs to be identified carefully. Refurbishment should be done properly, so that the respective Shelter Unit is brought under DAY-NULM compliance.

Member Secretaryalso suggested that shelter management skill need to be developed for the shelter management agencies/organisation. In respect to Management of urban homeless, every Shelter Unit should be linked with skill training courses under DAY-NULM or any other scheme available, which will help in improving the livelihoods of the Shelter inmates.

Hon'ble Chairman suggested that doctors of Govt. hospitals should visit to the shlterson a weekly/fortnightly basis, especially to the shelters where children are staying.Health & Family Welfare Department should ensure their visit and necessary directions may issued in this regard. While interacting with the NGOs/Shelter Management Agencies, Hon'ble Chairman suggested that the NGOs/Shelter Management Agencies should think and work out on the need of the shelters for further improvement and accordingly fund can be provided to the shelters.

Hon'ble Chairmandirected the state to submit a comprehensive roadmap for establishment of shelters by 2022 based on the estimated number of homeless in the State.

The action pointson management of shelters as a result of the meeting are summarised as under:

- Systematic urban homeless survey to be conducted in all ULBs to validate the survey data;
- Based on the survey, shelters are to be established either through refurbishing the existing buildings/Non-NULM shelters to be brought in compliance with NULM guidelines;
- iii. To conduct third party quality audit on a quarterly basis by engaging reputed institutions;
- iv. Profile of the shelters is to be uploaded in the portal by the States ;
- v. To submit a roadmap for establishment of required number of shelters by 2022;
- vi. Mission managers under DAY-NULM &State authorities should visit the shelters toidentify the need of the shelters;
- vii. State Legal Services Authority, Mizoram should also visit all Shelter Unit under the ambit of DAY-NULM in Mizoram. Identification of requirements or needs of the Shelters should be identified by Para legal volunteers and Advocate. The list of identified requirement or needs should further be intimated to the Mission Director, DAY-NULM, Mizoram.
- viii. Shelter Home, catering to Children below 7 years of age, should be visited by doctors every week. The matter should be addressed by Health & Family Welfare Department, Government of Mizoram.
- ix. Facilities prescribed by SUH Operational Guidelines should be strictly adhered to so that dignified life is provided to the homeless persons to achieve the major objective of the Mission.

- Converge all possible scheme benefits of the Govt. schemes for mainstreaming the homeless;
- wide publicity of shelters needs to be done like hoarding sign board and other means of publicity.
- xii. The pace of New Constructions of shelters should not be delayed further.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks by Dr. C. Vanlalramsanga, Secretary to the Government of Mizoram, UD&PA Dept. to the Chairperson and all the attendees.

DAY-1: 4th May, 2017

Motherless Baby Home, Khatla, Aizawl

The Committee visited Motherless Baby Home, Khatla, Aizawlsupported for refurbishment under DAY-NULM. The shelter, with the capacity for 25 children within the age group of 0-10 years, is managed by 'MizoHmeichheTangrual Pawl'. The building comprised of well-furnished hall, wash rooms, kitchen, care-takers room, beds for children with space for recreation amenities. During the visit there were 8 children present in the shelter.



The shelter has good arrangement of Bedding, food, water supply Electricity, Education, Health care & Counseling and other related rehabilitation measures for the children. As per the information. shelter one coordinator four and caretakers were working in the shelter. The shelter is maintaining the necessary registers, diet chart and daily routine for the children.

During the visit the Committee observed that periodic health check up is done in the private clinics/hospitals on payment basis. The committee suggested to address this issue immediately and arrangement need to be done for weekly visit of doctors of Govt. hospitals to the Shelter Homes so that homeless children are not taken out to the Doctors for medical checkup. The Committee suggested that the refurbishment activity taken up at the Shelter Unit should be completed. The floor elevated in RCC should be completely constructed so that the place could be utilized as recreation area for the children. The Committee directed the representative of Shelter Management Agency to identify their requirements/needs and intimate the same to the Mission Directorate for necessary action.



The Committee handpicked and interviewed a few of the beneficiaries who shared information regarding their daily routine; academic progress and information regarding their family members.



Transitional cum Children's Home, Saron Veng, Aizawl

The Shelter Unit caters to children in need of care and protection under POCSO Act. The shelter maintained by 'Centre for Peace of Development'accomodating girl children admitted by Child Welfare Committee of Aizawl. The capacity of the shelter is 50 and presently, 15 girls, within the age of 6 to 18 years, are staying there. Most importantly, the children are safely restored to their family, foster family, and/ orprovided

after care programme.

The building comprised of well-furnished hall, washrooms, kitchen, care taker's room, beds for children with space for recreation amenities. The shelter has good arrangement of Bedding, food, water supply electricity, education, health care &counseling and other related rehabilitation measures for the children. As per the information, one shelter coordinator, four caretakers were working in the shelter. The shelter was found maintaining necessary registers, diet chart and daily routine for the children.

The Committee suggested to the shelter coordinators to ensure RO water facilities

and proper wardrobes to the inmates. Apart from that it was suggested to conduct talent shows to identify the hidden talents of the children.Hon'bleChaiman,directed the representative of Shelter Management Agency to list out their requirements/needs and intimat the same to the Mission Directorate for necessary action.



Aizawl Shelter Home:

The Shelter Unit caters to children, in need of care and protection, admitted by Child Welfare Communittee, Aizawl. The Shelter accommodated both girl and boy child below the age of 18 years on separate floors. The shelter is manged by 'Centre for Peace of

Development'. It has acapacity of 50 and during the visit 15 childrens (10 girls and 5 boys) were present. Room is allotted to the children according to their age group.

The building comprised of wellfurnished hall, wash rooms, kitchen, care takers room, beds for children with space for recreation amenities. The shelter has good arrangement of bedding, food, water supply electricity, education, health care &counseling



and other related rehabilitation measures for the children. As per the information, one shelter coordinator, four caretakers were working in the shelter. The shelter is maintaining



routine for the children and a regular cook for

The Members enquiredabout their requirement by interacting with the Shelter Staff. The shelter coordinator shared some requirements like-colouring the rooms, sewing machine, computer etc for the shelter. The Committee directed the Shelter Home to intimate their requirements to the Mission Directorate for necessary action.

DAY-II: 5th May 2017

Thutak Nunpuitu Team, Muanna Veng, Aizawl

The Shelter Unit has already been identified to be supported under DAY-NULM, however, fund for New construction will be approved under the Action Plan of FY-2017-2018. The shelter is one of the biggest shelters comprising provisions for different groups. Thutak Nunpuitu Team, founded by Dr. Sangthankima in the year 1988 is a voluntary social organization and a unique set-up to



execute a triple purpose of maintaining a De-addiction cum Rehabilitation Centre for substance abusers and alcoholics, an Orphanage for orphans, street children and abandoned children, and a Home for the mentally disabled person. As per information provided, presently more than 650 inmates are staying in the shlter.

A Residential School covering Nursery to Class X with an Early Childhood Care &




Education Centre, Adult cum Continuing Education Centre, a Computer Training Centre, a Tailoring Training Centre, a Candle Making Industry, a School of Music & Fine Arts, Weightlifting Academy and Games & Sport Training Centre is being run successfully with the objective of physical and intellectual upliftment of the inmates since 1998. With a view to attain self sufficiency in respects of eggs, milk and meat,

the organization running a poultry farm, a diary farm and piggery. The TNT is a home for the down and out, destitute, street people, the mentally and physically disabled and a sort of refuge for terminally ill, HIV/AIDS patients. Mostly the shelter is being run through charity, donations and in convergence with various departments/agencies.

The Committee visited all the three section, viz. Rehabilitation Centre, Children's

Home and Mentally Challenged Home. In Rehabilitation Centre the Members interacted with the inmates and encouraged them not to get back to addiction and live a healthy and happy life.

From physical inspection, the Members suggested that proper and hygienic toilets should be planned for construction at Children's Shelter by the concerned CMMU. The Members also identified that the Children's Shelter is not well ventilated;



necessary refurbishment needs to be planned. The shelter home also need to take steps for colouring the rooms and provide proper cupboard to the inmates.

Hermon Children's Home, Durtlang, Aizawl

The Committee inspected the Shelter and suggested that the Shelter should be made



fully compliant with DAY-NULM guidelines and O&M support to be provided. The shelter is managed by 'Zoram evangelical Fellowship'. It has a capacity of 220 and during the visit there were 50children(33 boys & 17 girls) of different age group were present.

The building comprised of well-furnished hall, washrooms, kitchen, care takers room, bunk beds for children with space for recreation amenities also. The

shelter has a small clinic room with basic amenities.

The shelter has good arrangement of bedding, food, water supply electricity, education, health care &counseling and other related rehabilitation measures for the children. As per the information, Thome manager, 1 home mother, 1 nurse, 1 care taker, 3 warden (1 Male & 2 Female), 1 Asst. warden, 2 cooks, 2 driver etc.are working in the shelter.

The members enquired their requirement by interacting with the Shelter Staff. The shelter coordinator shared some requirements like- training on computer, typewriting, sewing, etc for the children. The Committee suggested the Mission Mangers to opt this

shelter under O & M of DAY-NULM for smooth maintenance and directed the Shelter Home to list out their requirement or needs which shall further be intimated to the Mission Directorate for necessary action.





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

Sub: Plan of Action for refurbishment /construction of Shelters for Urban Homeless and conducting of fresh survey for the identification of urban homeless in the State of Haryana.

In view of the recommendations made by Court Commissioners in CWP 196 of 2001 (IA No. 94 & 96), the State conducted two surveys for the identification of urban homeless population. Keeping in view the lesser number of urban homeless persons and their floating nature, all the Districts identified 93 Dharamshalas and Religious/ Charitable organizations for making night stay and cheap food arrangement for urban homeless persons. The State made provisions of funds for the construction of night shelters by dovetailing the schemes of different departments. The concerned State Govt. Departments extended benefits (i.e. Health facilities, Social security, Child education etc.) of various Govt, schemes for their welfare. Out of these 93 night shelters (other than NULM), 26 night shelters are being managed by ULBs, 32 night shelters by the District Red Cross Societies and remaining 35 night shelters by different NGOs /Religious

In view of the launch of National Urban Livelihood Mission (NULM), the State Govt. notified the State Level Nodal Agency (SLNA), constitution of Governing Council, Executive Council, and Project Sectioning Committee (PSC). The State Govt, decided to fund the construction/ refurbishment of Shelters for Urban Homeless under NULM scheme. The State has decided to identify those night shelters (out of operational 93 night shelters), which can be refurbished as per SUH-NULM guidelines. Further, the State has decided to construct new permanent Shelters in different towns by giving priority to million plus population towns and towns of National Capital Region (NCR) and Chandigarh Capital Region (CCR) as well as towns of historic/religious importance. Further, it has also been decided to conduct a fresh survey for the identification of urban homeless persons by timelines are drawn as under:

In compliance of these directions, a fresh aurvey of urban homeless persons has been carried out by the ULBs between 15th Feb. to 28 Feb., 2017. Survey reports have been complied and a consolidated list is sent herewith As per this survey a total number of 2302 persons were found under Bridges, on payments, near worship places, bus stands, milway stations, hospitals etc. All the ULBs have been directed to pursue the homeless persons to stay in the shelters constructed for homeless persons.

To ensure that all the shelters constructed with NULM funds and other shelters being run by ULBs meet the NULM guidelines, following initiatives would be taken :-

- 1. Helpline to be started by all ULBs

- Completion of third party audit by the concerned ULBs

- Within 60 days.

- within 30 days.

- within 03 months from the date of operationlisation of shelter and then every year in the month of April.
 - Within 30 days
- Detail of shelters to be displayed/updated on departmental portal under heading DAY-NULM.
- Physical verification of all shelters being run under DAY- NULM and other than DAY- NULM.
- Ten senior level officers not below the rank of Chief Engineer/SE/XEN or other class one officers to be deputed to carry out physical verifications of shelters
- Proposals to be obtained from ULBs for up-gradation / refurbishment of non DAY- NULM shelters to ensure the meticulous compliance of guidelines issued by GOI.

- 3. Dinner, drinking water
- 4. Television facility.

They are also providing with the following:-

- > Providing ID cards, so far (15) inmates have been provided with ID cards.
- Providing counseling and rejoining with their families, so far (3) members have been rejoined with their families.
- Providing old age pensions, so far (25) members have been provided with old age pensions in various shelters.
- Imparting training for earning livelihoods, so far (14) members have been given training in different faculties like candle making, agarbathi making etc.
- > Providing Aadhar cards, so far (9) members have been provided with Aadhar cards.
- > Providing voter ID cards, so far (9) members have been provided with voter ID cards.
- Providing medical facilities such as periodical check up of B.P, sugars etc. are provided at the shelters.
- Further it is submitted that follow up action will be taken to make rest of the other shelters sanctioned operational.
- Further sanctions will be given for establishment of Shelters for Urban Homeless as per the requirement based on the proposals submitted by the ULBs as per the action plan.

SHELTER FOR URBAN HOMELESS PLAN, 2022 FOR MIZORAM

INTRODUCTION

Survey of Urban Homeless 2017 was conducted in Mizoram from February 2017. The Survey was conducted at all DAY-NULM operational areas by each City Mission Management Unit.

Methodology

The Survey and need Assessment of Urban Homeless was conducted by using Interview Schedule for identification of Urban Homeless and Focus Group Discussion for identification of Need Assessment and Resources available. The format for Interview Schedule and Need Assessment was prepared based on recommendation of Clause 6.2 of SUH Operational Amended Guidelines issued by MoHUPA on 7th December 2015.

Limitations

The Survey was a continuous process and due to some unexpected challenges in the process of collection of data, survey is not entirely completed. Due to this the Plan submitted herewith is exclusive of certain urban homeless staying at Shelter Homes where further approval from Church Authority and concern Government Department is mandatory.

Findings from the Survey

Homeless concentration area

Homeless concentration area as such is not existed across Mizoram. However, the existing Shelters are usually located on the outskirts of the Cities, Towns and Village.

Profiles

During the survey of Urban Homeless, 2017 total number of 1,351 urban homeless were enumerated (excluding inmates of Jeriko Khualbuk,Aizawl, Orphanage Boys Home, Siaha & Adult Rehabilitation Centre in Serchhip). The profile of the enumerated Urban Homeless are analysed based on different categories.

a. Broad Age Group : The age group of children was based on the aged group of children defined at the Juvenile Justice Act 2015. There are 210 children below 6 years, 655 children within the age group of 7-18 years old. 19 – 59 years of age are categorised as Adult and there are 453 amongst the total enumerated Urban Homeless. Other than these, the aged who are 60 and above years of age are 27.

Other than these, the age of 6 persons cannot be identified due to mentall illness.

h. Bad habits of Urban Homeless: During the survey, it was found out that among 1,351 urban homeless enumerated during the survey, only 142 persons are having Bad habits. The Bad habits are categorised into three groups viz-a-viz Drugs, Alcohol & others (smoking/inhalant, etc).

52 persons are reported as having involvement with illicit drugs use, 47 persons are reported as alcohol abuse while 43 persons are reported as having a habit of consuming Tobacco (smoking & eating) or some other type of inhalant.

Needs and aspiration of homeless

During the survey, it was found out that among 1,351 urban homeless enumerated during the survey, 570 persons are Urban homeless permanently staying at the Shelters, most cases these urban homeless are abandoned by their families while 777 persons are staying at the Shelters on temporary basis as the inmates are most often reintegrated with their close families or relatives or adopted. Out of 1351 urban homeless enumerated 1225 person reported that they are willing to stay in a well furnished shelter with basic needs.

In all DAY-NULM Towns, 60 Shelter homes/units have been identified however, Survey of Urban Homeless/collection of primary data from inmates of the shelter homes/units was collected from 57 Shelter homes/Units.

Types of Shelters

The shelters identified are of the following types:

उत्तर प्रदेश में शहरी बेघरों के लिये आश्रय उपलब्ध कराने की कार्ययोजना / रोड मैप

1. पृष्ठभूमि— शहरी बेघर व्यक्तियों का नगरों और देश की अर्थव्यवस्था में महत्वपूर्ण योगदान है किन्तु उन्हें बिना आश्रम और सामाजिक सुरक्षा के जीवन यापन करना पड़ता है। उनके समक्ष स्वास्थ्य, शिक्षा, भोजन, पेयजल और स्वच्छता आदि चुनौतियों के साथ जीवन यापन करना पड़ता है। दीनदयाल अन्त्योदय योजना—राष्ट्रीय शहरी आजीविका मिशन का लक्ष्य ऐसे शहरी बेघर व्यक्तियों को शहरी बेघरों हेतु आश्रय योजना में आवश्यक सेवाओं से युक्त स्थायी आश्रय चरणबद्ध रीति से उपलब्ध कराना है।



"STREET TO SHELTERS"

Background:

A significant number of the estimated 80 to 200 million of the population sleeping nungry every night comprise nomeless people. The condition makes them susceptible to extreme weather conditions which, sometimes amounts to death. Several numbers of them, in fact, have died in the streets in winter but in no avail could be associated to starvation.

Homeless population is among the most vulnerable and disadvantaged sectors in the country. Despite however, 60% of them, based on <u>the Commissioners' Eighth Report</u>, are not covered by food schemes and or other forms of assistance provided for below the poverty line (BPL) category of the population due to non-ownership of a proof of residence.

In case of Union Territory of Chandigarh, 4139 persons are homeless as per report of Primary Census Abstract for Homeless Population, 2011. The following chart shows that the total urban homeless are 4133, whereas total male and female persons corresponding to urban homeless are 3837 and 302 respectively.

The National Urban Housing & Habitat Policy (NUHHP), 2007 aims at promoting

sustainable development of hubitat in the country with a view to ensuring equitable supply of land, sheater and services at attordable prices to all sections Female ,302Chidren (0-6 yts),319 Total Homelesi,413 9 Male,3837 Rural 6 Urban ,4133

of the society. However, the most vulnerable of these are the urban homeless.

The Urban homeless persons contribute to the aconomy of the cities and thus the nation as cheep labour in the informal sector: yet they live with no shelter or social security protection. The urban homeless survive with many challenges like no access to elementary public services such as health education, food, water and sanitation.



National Urban Livelihoods Mission (NULM) aims at providing permanent shelter equipped with

essential services to the urban homeless in a phased manner under the Scheme of Shelter for Urban Homeless (SUH).

Definition:



A nomeliess person is the one who cannot afford housing or are unable to maintain a regular and us a shelter, India is home to about 78 million homeless people despite the country growing in global economic stature.

Some facts on the homelessness in India and worldwide:

- According to studies, 100 million people worldwide are literally homeless and the number would surpass 100 million if all people who lack an adequate home with secure occupancy are included.
- According to a 2005 study by the United Nations, an estimated 100 million people were homeless worldwide and as many as 1 billion people lacked adequate housing
- In India. The number of homeless people declined by about 66,000 households in rural areas, and went up by about 69,000 households in urban areas in 2013
- Rejection of homeless
- Other states that has had the teast success in reducing the proportion of homeless persons include Haryana and West Bengal
- Uttar Pracesh, Maharashtra, Rajasthan and Madnya Pradesh account for about half the country's homeless population
- The lowest homeless proportion is found in Mizoram (about 0.01 percent) and Andaman (about 0.02 percent)
- According to the National Law Center on Homelessness and Poverty (NLCHP), more than 90 percent of nomeless women are victime of domestic violence which results in their escaping from their homes
- According to the NLCHP, the lack of affordable housing is a primary cause of homelessness
- Reports say that about 20 to 25 percent of the homeless suffer from severe mantal liness.

Sub:- Regarding measures for the safety of Urban Homeless sleeping on pavements and footpaths.

Dear Sirs,

Four days back a shocking incident of death of one person and serious injury to other three persons who were sleeping on the footpath near ISBT. Kashmere Gate was the front page news in almost all the national daily's. Such kind of deaths of poor and homeless at the hands of reckless and drunk drivers is not a new phenomenon in the capital city of the country.

Being the Chairman of the committee constituted by the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India to monitor the progress and condition of shelter homes for the urban poor all over the country, I along with my committee members paid a visit to the said spot of the incident at about 10 pm on 21.04.2017. To my utter shock I found two persons sleeping on the same pavement where a day before the said tragic incident had taken place.

While walking through the area with the officials from Delhi Urban Shelter Improvement Board ('DUSIB') along with some persons from the NGO Prayas, I noticed an incident which was very disturbing. At a distance of merely 50 metres from where we all were standing we saw that one person came on a riksahaw and with the help of the riskshaw puller lifted another person who was sleeping on the pavement to the rikshaw and thereafter the rikshaw started moving back towards the opposite direction. I immediately directed some of the officials of DUSIB and of NGO Prayas to call these people to ascertain the fact situation. To

my utter shock I found that the person who was lifted on the rikshaw was a lady who seemed to be under the influence of intoxication and same was the position of the other person on the rikshaw. The police was called and after some time the beat constable reached followed by the Sub Inspector and the SHO of PS Kashmere Gate. I requested the SHO to interrogate all the three persons and also get their medical examination done and ascertain whether the said persons had lifted the women for sexual exploitation.

I also discussed with the area SHO as to how hundreds of such urban homeless are being allowed to sleep on the pavements, dividers and footpaths in the middle of busy roads and what safety measures are being taken to protect their lives. In response the SHO informed that within the jurisdiction of PS Kashmere Gate, itself approximately 5000 such urban homeless sleep on these pavements and most of them are under influence of one or the other psychotropic substance and it is a kind of helpless situation to deal with these kinds of persons.

The DUSIB and NGO people also informed that these people do not prefer to move into the nearby shelter homes and prefer to sleep on the pavements/footpaths for reasons such as less mosquitoes due to pollution on the road and the flow of air caused by moving traffic. I was also informed that if all these drug addicts or persons under the influence of alcohol are taken into the shelter homes then they shall spoil the atmosphere of the shelters and there is a threat of others being encouraged to the use of the said drugs.

The situation, no doubt is very alarming in entire Delhi as these urban homeless sleep on the foot paths and pavements during night hours and despite the rescue teams deployed by various NGO's to persuade these people to shift to shelter homes they do not come forward readily to move in the shelter homes because of diverse reasons.

Life of every citizen is precious and important and in my view the authorities should not feel totally helpless to provide these people a more safe and secure place to sleep during night hours. One of the idea which struck to my mind was that the urban homeless who are not willing to move to the nearby shelters atleast can be placed at a safer and secure place to sleep during the peak summer and not on small pavements in the middle of busy roads where the death can struck to anyone and anytime at the hands of reckless and drunk drivers. To accomplish this task area SHO's in coordination with the concerned maintenance agencies of the state/municipal body that are responsible to maintain the footpaths/pavements can carry out the survey to find out safe and secure sites preferably near to the place where these homeless and poor people usually sleep.

The State government/ Municipal Bodies can also take steps to erect railings on both sides of the divider and likewise on the edges of footpaths/pavements with plantation of saplings/plants on the divider, footpaths/pavements with the provision of giving an access to the pedestrians wherever required.

Minutes of the meeting held under the Chairmanship of Chief Secretary, GNCTD on 31.05.2017 at 11.00 AM in the Conference Room at 5th Level, Delhi Secretariat to discuss on various matters relating to the "Urban Homeless" in NCT of Delhi.

The list of officials present in the meeting is enclosed at Annexure-I.

Initiating the discussion the Chief Secretary, GNCTD, directed CEO 1. (DUSIB) to brief the Officers present about the agenda points. The CEO (DUSIB) apprised that Hon'ble Supreme Court of India is monitoring the Shelters for Urban Homeless in the Country and it has constituted a Committee under the Chairmanship of Justice Shri Kailash Gambhir, Justice (Retd.) for monitoring the progress and conditions of shelter for homeless. Shri Kailash Gambhir, Justice (Retd.) the Chairman of the committee and other members of the Committee of Shelter for Urban Homeless had undertaken a visit of Kashmere Gate area at 10.00 P.M. on aforesaid visit. he has made certain 21.04.2017. Based on the observations/suggestion vide his letter dated 25/04/2017. This meeting has been convened to discuss these observations/suggestions.

The matter was discussed in detailed and point wise record of discussions is as under:

(i) Measures to control urban homeless sleeping on the medians, pavements and footpaths of roads :

It was felt that a special drive may be launched by the Police and other civic agencies including DUSIB to prevent homeless from sleeping on the footpaths or medians. Delhi Police agreed to issue the requisite instructions to all their SHOs and Beat Officers for patrolling in these areas to dissuade homeless from sleeping on the medians of the roads, pavements etc. It was also decided that the concerned road owning agencies such as PWD & MCDs will explore the possibility of installing the railings on the sides of central verge wherever possible in a way that no homeless can use the central verge for sleeping. Both civic agencies concerned and police may take necessary action and submit an action taken report within one month.

(Action : Delhi Police/MCD/PWD)

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(ii) Measures to promote use of DUSIB night shelters by urban homeless:

It was decided that DUSIB in association with NGOs concerned will persuade the homeless staying on pavement etc. to move to the nearest shelte: to avoid any accident/untoward incident at the road side. CEO(DUSIB) assured that he will intensify the rescue operation. The Delhi Police was also requested to deploy its staff in case of any requirement, which was agreed by the Acd: Commissioner of Police (H.Q.) present in the meeting.

(Action: DUSIB/ Delhi Police)

(iii) Establishing drug de-addiction facilities at various Hospitals, DUSIB shelters etc. Further separate drug de-addiction centres may also to be established :

Secretary (Health) apprised that 07 hospitals have been set up for drug de-addiction or treating the drug de-addicts which are sufficient to cater to these homeless people also. He stated that the homeless drug addicts can be referred to these hospitals. NGOs managing the shelters should be sensitized to get involved in drug de-addiction of the homeless. He also apprised that a new de-addiction centre at Lampur is proposed to be set up by Health Department in coordination with SPYM, NGO.

(Action : Health Deptt./ DUSIE)

(iv) Extending various additional facilities such as good potable water, mosquito net, recreation facilities, health facilities etc. at the night shelters in order to attract the homeless:

The CEO(DUSIB) informed that DUSIB has provided sufficient durries, blankets, water storage tanks for portable water, firefighting equipment, fans, mosquito repellants and dessert coolers in all the 200 Night Shelters. To overcome the mosquito menace DUSIB is providing wire mesh in all the doors and windows of Night Shelters. Also to combat the heat corrosive paint has been done on the roof of porta cabins. He also informed that DUSIB has already installed 58 TV sets and installation in the remaining 142 Shelters shall be made available during this year. Further, DUSIB is in process of procuring 10,000 mattresses, bunker beds, 10,000 pillows, 20,000 bed sheets before winters to give better facilities to the homeless.

(Action : DUSIB)

(v)

Water supply and Health facilities to inmates of Night Shelters:

It was decided that Delhi Jal Board will ensure to provide potable water on regular basis in various Shelters as per their requirement. Regarding extension of the Health facilities in these homeless shelters, Mobile Medical Vans of Health Department will also provide the facility for treatment of the homeless.

(Action : Health Deptt./Delhi Jal Board)

(vi) Regular fogging of Night Shelters:

It was decided that Sanitation Department of respective MCDs will provide IRS (Indoor Residual Spray) on inside wall and regular fogging to avoid breeding of mosquito at inside and outside the shelter.

(Action : Respective MCDs)

The meeting ended with vote of thanks to the Chair.

As you are aware that as per Hon'ble Supreme Court Order dated 11th November, 2016 in WP (Civil) No. 55/2003 and WP (Civil) No. 572/2003, a Committee has been constituted under my Chairmanship and having Shri Sanjay Kumar, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation, Union of India as its Member and Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, District and Session Judge (Retd), Delhi as Member Secretary.

2, In this connection, I would like to draw your attention to the letter No. N-11028/8/2014-USD/Vol.V_dated 16th December, 2016, of Shri Neeraj Kumar Gupta, Member-Secretary of the Committee, addressed to you asking for certain information in respect of Shelters for Urban Homeless (permanent, temporary as well as rian baseras) being run in your State with the assistance of DAY-NULM or any other scheme. 
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



With reference to the subject cited above, I am to inform you that, the State Government vide Letter No. 10/609/2013/DMA/98 dated 11/04/2016 (copy enclosed), addressed to the Member Secretary, Goa State Legal Services Authority, Panaji-Goa, and Letter No. 10/609/2013/DMA/1576 dated 28/08/2015 (copy enclosed) addressed to the Under Secretary, Ministry of Housing & Urban Poverty Alleviation (HUPA), Government of India, New Delhi, has informed that the State of Goa is having 33 permanent shelters having capacity to accommodate 2180 homeless which are being maintained by the Government / Grant-in-aid institutions. It was further informed that the existing facilities are sufficient to take care of the homeless, and hence there are no plans for creation of new shelters. In the said letter, it was further informed that the amount available with the State Government would be utilized for the purpose of up-gradation of existing shelter for urban homeless.

As regards to, city-wise expenditure incurred on construction, refurbishment and maintenance of shelters is concerned, this Agency has not incurred any expenditure as yet, the information is furnished in the proforma prescribed by you.

The Committee has been apprised by Ministry of HUPA that funds are released to the States in a consolidated manner which can be used towards any of the Components of NULM and it is for the states to earmark funds to each and every component of DAY-NULM (including' SUH) as per requirement. The Committee is of the opinion that there is a requirement of clarity on availability of funds at the State level for SUH component so as to monitor any diversion/ non-utilisation of funds, as mandated by the Hon'ble Supreme Court.

Undoubtly, the States by asking for release of fund from Ministry of HUPA must be taking into the account, specific requirement for shelters for urban homeless for Operation, Maintenance, Construction and Refurbishment etc; and must be placing before the Audit Committee the respective expenses incurred for operation, Maintenance, Construction and Refurbishment etc. The State is directed that the funds for SUH should be kept in a separate head of accounts and be intimated by the State to Ministry of HUPA and to the Committee accordingly, within 15 days.
